TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Only Need a Spanking.

Ogden, Jan. 24.—The Standard today
contains an interview with Captain Schley,
of the steamer Baltimore, who passed
through Ogden last night on his way to
Washington. In the course of the inter-
view the captain commented quite freely on
the situation. Among other things he said:
"Chilians have not the slightest concep-
tion of the power and magnitude of the
United States. In their estimation they
have a far better navy than we have. In
my estimation they have not. I would like
to give them just one hour's brush and
probably by that time they would uncer-
tainly change their opinion. The United States
should treat Chili as an unruly child and
spank it."

In Chili.

SANTIAGO, Jan. 25.—The excitement
over the embargo with the United States
is growing rapidly. The Valparaiso in-
cident is the prevailing topic of conversation
and the probable results of a war are eagerly
discussed. It was definitely ascertained
today that Senor Pereira, the Chilean min-
ister of foreign affairs, has sent United
States Minister Egan a formal notification
that the Chilean government will reply to-
morrow to the note containing the ultimatum
of the United States government.

An Earthquake

ROME, Jan. 25.—A most extraordinary
scene occurred at the opera last night. There
was a crowded attendance, caused by the
debut of Count Celani in "Traviata." The
debutant had an enormous success, and was
re-called five times. About 11 o'clock two
distinct shocks of earthquake were felt. All
the occupants of the boxes quit the house
with precipitation. The shocks caused
great consternation throughout the city and
they caused a panic in the more crowded
quarters of the city.

The Tsunat Result

TOLEDO, O. Jan. 24.—Calvin Bronson died
last Monday, leaving \$1,000,000 to one
daughter and six grandchildren. He ap-
pointed an old time friend of his as the
trustee of the estate for twenty years, dur-
ing which time the heirs are to have only
\$1000 per year each. Yesterday they gave
notice that they would contest, alleging the
testator to have been of unsound mind.
Heirs in California are helping in the fight
and a bitter contest is probable.

The Behring Sea Settlement

NEW YORK, Jan. 24. Among the passen-
gers who arrived today on the steamer
Elvira was Sir George Baden-Powell, the
British Behring sea commissioner, who
will endeavor to bring about an amicable
settlement regarding the fisheries trouble.
Sir George will probably go to Canada from
here to confer with the Canadian authori-
ties, after which he will go to Washington.

A Gloom Week

LONDON, Jan. 24.—It has been a week
which few people in London would care to
have over again. Not a few have expressed
their opinion of it by not living. The death
roll is nearly, or quite without precedent,
and the depression among survivors is al-
together unexampled. The influenza and
grief for the Duke of Clarence contributed
each its share to the general gloom.
