

REPEATING A FALSEHOOD.

All the manufacturers of woollens in our eastern states are not so narrow and short-sighted as to join in demanding free wool while still insisting on protection of woollens.

The Oregonian by indirection and direction as well, has scores of times made the statement that the democrats propose to put wool on the free list and leave the present duty on woollen goods.

"Measures contemplating a repeal of the duties on raw material must, in the nature of things be accompanied by readjustments of the duties on woollen goods, and whatever advantages, if any, might accrue to our manufacturers from free raw material, would be set off, in the first instance by the necessity of readjusting business to these new rates of duties on goods."

THE LAW DOETH DETERMINE IT.

The Salem Journal under the caption of "Will Elect," says: Talks with republican politicians at Salem, reveal the fact that the office of County Judge Davidson and Attorney-General Chamberlain, must, in their opinion, be filled by election in June next.

A county judge will have to be elected in Marion next June. This question was determined in the case of the State of Oregon ex rel J J Whitney reported in Third Oregon Reports page 533-38.
