

GOOD EVENING

AFTER 45 YEARS.—The Watsonville, Calif., Rustler, says: Mrs. A. M. Hines, of Albany, Oregon, is visiting her cousin, Judge McKean, of Corvallis. The judge had not seen his cousin since he started across the plains in 1847, and they met at the Watsonville depot last Friday. He was apprised of her expected arrival there on that day, and was there to meet her. Among the throng alighting from the train he was puzzled to determine which was his cousin. Forty-five years is a long time, and it is not surprising that he could not select from the crowd the person he was expecting. After several mistakes he finally found the right one and he departed with her for his home at Corvallis. At the time of their parting in that year, 1847, each had been recently married. Since that time each has reared a family which are now grown to manhood and womanhood, and each has many grandchildren. Their reminiscences and experiences, if written as related by them, each to the other, would make quite a large volume of interesting reading.

AN OPPORTUNITY.—As a shipping center, and with her superior facilities, Albany is splendidly situated not only for becoming eventually a great wholesale city, but as well a manufacturing city. In manufacturing particularly at the present time we should be constantly reaching out. At a small cost, compared to the benefit, this city could add within a year or two, four or five factories that would do wonders in assisting to build up, and make it a manufacturing center. At the present time there is an opportunity offered to secure a furniture and chair factory, employing about twenty-five hands. Let our business men see that we get it.

THE A. S. C. R. R.—There is a general feeling of dissatisfaction among many of the stockholders of the Astoria & South Coast Railroad over the foreclosure of the \$55,000 mortgage, says the Town Talk. They maintain that the road is worth \$150,000. Last year it paid a good sum above operating expenses. Extravagance and mismanagement is the cause of the present bad condition of the property. From present indications it looks as though it will be a couple years before the mortgage will be foreclosed, and in that time some interesting developments may be expected if there is not a change in the management.

A ONCE PROMINENT MAN.—Leader Holmes, the Portland lawyer who was committed to the asylum a day or so ago, was a very prominent man in the early settlement of this state, and served as a delegate to the republican national convention in 1860, the same convention that nominated Abraham Lincoln for president. As Mr. Holmes was unable to attend he sent his proxy to Horace Greeley, and in that manner the great editor became a member of the convention, and it is claimed now that Lincoln's nomination was largely due to Greeley's efforts in his behalf.—Statesman.

A REPUBLICAN CLUB.—At the Court House last night a Republican club was organized with H. H. Hewitt as chairman and C. B. Winn, Secretary. A committee on names for membership consisting of W. C. Tweedale, W. B. Barr, J. N. Duncan, C. B. Winn, J. R. Wyatt and J. R. Whitney was appointed, and Wednesday night was named as a time for effecting a permanent organization, and the election of delegates to the Portland convention. Speeches were made by H. H. Hewitt, S. S. Train, N. M. Newton, W. C. Tweedale, J. N. Duncan, J. R. Wyatt and others.

AN ARTISTIC STAR.—Mr. C. H. Hart, the painter and artist, has just completed for the Eastern Star lodge, recently organized in this city, a large star, 13 feet 8 inches from point to point, to be used in their work. It is a handsome piece of work, artistically executed, and confers credit on the artist. Mr. Hart is also at work on several other pieces, showing that his skill as an artist is being appreciated.

COULDN'T AGREE.—Double houses are sometimes unpropitious affairs. Yesterday afternoon Jack Burkall, who lives in one end of a double house, had John Holton and John Marsh, who reside in the other end, arrested for disturbing the peace. They were taken before the Recorder, by whom the case was dismissed. There was talk of a counter arrest, but very properly the whole matter was dropped.

RAILROAD TALK.—Here is more talk about a transcontinental railroad. The Telegram says: It is now a probability that Oregon will, before another year passes, have a fourth transcontinental railway. From what can be learned, although the officials are somewhat reticent, as usual, the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern will, within the course of a few weeks, commence work on its Eastern extension from Roseburg to a connection with the Chicago & Northwestern in Colorado or some other of the great Western roads. Preliminary surveys of this route were made three years ago, which carried the road across Oregon and some miles into Idaho. The work was done under the direction of an engineer by the name of Miller, who had been employed on the Chicago & Northwestern. An actual location of the line was never run, though it is thought that it has practically been decided on.

A WONDERFUL PERFORMANCE.



The entertainment given last night by Carl King was an education to those fortunate in witnessing it. His powers, honestly displayed, indicate that the possibilities of the human frame are not yet half understood, and that many of us may possess faculties never dreamed of.

Before displaying his wonderful abilities in mind-reading a committee consisting of Dr. W. H. Davis, C. B. Winn, Mr. Sower, J. A. Cumming, J. R. Whitney and the Democrat man was appointed by the audience to see that everything was on the square. Among the things done were the following: While Mr. King was blindfolded behind the curtains, in the presence of two of the committee, the case in every feat, seven or eight articles were gathered from the audience, placed in a handkerchief and hid by a member of the committee. Leading the way, blindfolded, with his hand held out of that of the committee he found the package, opened it and returned each article to the owner in the audience. A pin hole was made in a window sash, and the pin hid in the entrance to the Opera House.

Mr. King, in the same manner, found the pin and stuck it in the hole, all the time blindfolded. A sealed letter was returned to the man named inside, who was first correctly described. As it was Mr. Al Boenick there was no mistaking the description. The word frog, on page 199, of a book was marked and placed among other books; the book was found, and the page and word pointed out by the blindfolded man, who first told what they were, — a clean case of mind-reading. His greatest performance was the last one.

A committee of three went out on the street, passed down the north side of First street, crossed on a narrow crossing to the south side, went to the Revere House, returned and went up to the Philharmonic club rooms, in the third story of the Oregon Bank, got an Indian club and hid it in a garret in the Herald office. Mr. King, leading the committee with a long copper wire, followed over the same route exactly, blindfolded thoroughly, finding the club in its hiding place, a remarkable exhibition of his powers, doing his work rapidly in each case, it is said faster than even the famous Bishop, whom he undoubtedly excels.

The music on the mandolin by Don Jose Ramirez and family was of a fine order. Don Jose is an expert and the audience was delighted with his performance.

Tonight another entertainment will be given, admission 75, 50 and 25 cents, and as the performance is a clean, marvelous affair, and an educator, there should be a crowded house.

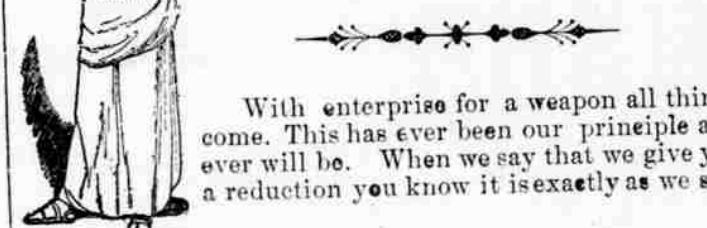
