TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

He Knows Us.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—The Herald's San-
tiago special says: "The American question
came up in the chamber of deputies today.
Deputy Jordan said much alarm and con-
cern existed in the public mind relative to
the affairs between the two countries. He
thought the ministers should make some
definite statement about the matter. The
fact was, in his opinion, that the United
States was a great nation, honorable and
just in its dealings. He could not believe
there was any desire on her part to humil-
iate Chili. He felt positive of her good in-
tentions, and urged the chamber to remem-
ber the position they assumed when the
French occupied Mexico."

A Montana Man.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—The mineral
lands of Montana and Idaho, claimed by the
Northern Pacific railroad, entered materi-
ally into the question of the selection of
a judge for the ninth circuit. It is un-
derstood that the president has stated, rather
emphatically, that he did not want to ap-
point any one who would be liable to divide
in favor of the Northern Pacific road on
the acquisition of these mineral lands. For
these reasons he has been seriously consid-
ering the advisability of appointing Judge
Hiram Knowles, new United States district
judge of Montana.

An Era of Ultimatum.

ARKANSAS, Kan Jan 26.—There are no
longer any doubts as to the purpose of the
leaders of the recent mob. Judge Botkin
has received reliable intelligence of their
ultimatum, which is that the county attor-
ney must drop the prosecution and recall
all warrants. Judge Botkin must resign
and he and some of his friends must move
out of the district. The wishes of the lead-
ers must be consulted by the governor in the
appointment of a successor to Botkin.

Not a Political Party.

UNION, Or Jan 26.—At the regular meet-
ing of the Farmers' Alliance and Industrial
Union of Union county, held here, the
largest delegation of the season was present.
The third party issue was fully discussed
and the following is the result:

"Resolved, That we, as an alliance, are
not a political party, but, as free citizens of
America, will support those men who favor
the demands of the National Farmers' Al-
liance and Industrial Union, severally, ac-
cording to our judgment."

The resolution met with general approv-
al.

Prefers the Print Shop.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—The report that
Whitelaw Reid, minister to France, would
resign that position and return to the
United States to re-enter the field of jour-
nalism was confirmed at the state depart-
ment today. Mr. Reid is expected here
early in February. It is believed the cause
of his resignation is a desire to resume his
lifetime labors in the newspaper profession.

Spending the Surplus.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—Senator Hawley
to day introduced a bill to establish a mili-
tary post near Helena, Mont upon re-
quisition, without cost, by the United States,
of 1000 acres of land. For the erection of
the necessary buildings, \$200,000 is appro-
priated.
