AN OREGON HEROINE.

A Pennsylvania man after making a trip through Oregon, going to Florence in Lane county, wrote a long letter to his home paper, and among other things, such as a compliment for the beautiful Willamette valley, one of the richest farming countries in the world, he tells the following: About noon we reached Hale's, where we stopped for dinner and changed horses. Here we saw one of the heroines of Oregon, Miss Anna Whisman, daughter of one of the proprietors of the stage line. Five years ago, at the age of seventeen or eighteen years she began to carry the mail on horseback over the mountains, a distance of nearly forty miles. She continued at this most of the time for two years, in some of the worst weather that this rainy, muddy region can produce. During these two years Miss Whisman's lonely rides through this desolate region were not without adventure. One time she found her road cut off by forest fire, which were raging in the mountains. She tried in several places to find a way through, but had to turn back and take another road, and by riding at night, succeeded in getting through on time. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

We Love Each Other Now.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—The developments in the Chilean controversy since the presidents ultimatum have been a series of surprises. When the first news of the decision of the Chilean government to practically concede all the United States asked from Santiago, it indicated such a complete change on the part of the Chileans that, while there was hope it was true, many persons were hardly able to credit it. The later dispatch not only confirmed this message, but each new development added to it some feature, making it stronger than the statement originally made.

Be Quoted His Pa

PORT TOWNSEND, Jan. 27.—E. N. Dearly, a son of United States Judge Dearly, of Portland, has made a peculiar application to Collector Wasson, which causes a great deal of comment here. Dearly asks permission to bring in a number of Chinese from British Columbia, representing that they had a right in the United States, having formerly resided here. Wasson refused and Dearly insisted, on the ground that under a recent ruling by his father, such Chinese had a right in the United States, but was again refused.

A United Effort

CHICAGO Jan. 27.—Today the national conference of representatives of the various political reform movements now existent in this country, held a secret session. Miss Frances E. Willard presided, and stated the object of the conference was to devise ways and means of electing a president of the United States who will with one blow kill the run traffic. The idea is to unite all these elements on one candidate for president, in the belief they outnumber either of the regular parties.

Students Suspended

SEATTLE, Wash Jan. 27.—Ten students were suspended from the state university today for refusing to drill. They have determined to ask the faculty to reinstate them Friday, and if their demand is not complied with they will ask the court to grant a writ of mandamus to compel the college authorities to reinstate them.

Garza Deserted

SAN ANTONIO, Jan. 27.—There is little prospect of an early fight between the troops and Garza's men. It is stated upon reliable authority that Garza has only two men with him—his brother and an experienced scout; that they hide in the brush during the day, and venture out only at night to obtain supplies from friendly ranchmen.

A Day of Special Prayer

LONDON, Jan. 27.—Rev Mr. Spurgeon, of the London Tabernacle, has issued a circular proposing that the churches set apart next Monday as a day of special prayer for the abatement of the scourge of influenza. Spurgeon's letter concludes: "With the court and nation in deepest mourning, it is time to cry mightily unto the Lord."
