

RETRENCHMENT AND REFORM.

Mr Holman changed his mind Friday about permitting amendments to his retrenchment resolutions and they were put to the vote in the same form that they were debated on the previous day.

The second resolution was also adopted, but by a smaller vote in its favor and a larger one against it. The explanation of this diminished support is the fear that it might be construed into a declaration against such appropriations as that for river and harbor improvements.

The republicans congratulate themselves on their shrewdness in having anticipated the action of the democratic congress by making the steamship subsidies and sugar bounty part of the permanent expenses of the government for a term of years, therefore compelling annual appropriations to meet them unless the credit of the government is to be impaired.

THE DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATE.

In choosing its candidate for the presidency this year the democratic party will be governed mainly by its desire to win in the elections.

Though the partisans of individual aspirants may not be able to understand it, the party is not concerned to exalt the horn of this man or that. Its purpose is to elect the candidate who can most surely be elected.

It wants a good democrat in the White House, and it does not greatly care which of many good democrats he shall be. It wants democratic laws enacted and democratic policies carried out. It desires to take the shortest road to that end. It will select its candidate with reference to his election. Personal considerations and personal "booms" will have secondary place in the convention's consideration if the convention truly reflects the attitude and will of the party.

A bill to take a census of the population of New York has become a law. As soon as the census is complete a new districting of the state into assembly and senatorial districts will be made. The World estimates that a fair apportionment will make the legislature democratic on joint ballot by majorities ranging from 14 to 38, based upon the result of the last election.

MR BLAINE'S HEALTH.

It is idle to attempt to disguise the fact that Secretary Blaine is a very sick man. It is not merely an accidental attack of illness, but his physical power is broken to an extent that obviously impairs his mental capacity when any serious strain is put upon it.

It has been evident to all intelligent observers of Mr Blaine's physical condition during the last two years that he is a hopeless invalid, and it is simply cruel to attempt to keep him under the strain of a presidential contest. Indeed, the conviction can hardly be resisted that many of those who are pressing him as an ostensible candidate, are simply masquerading under his acknowledged exceptional popularity to advance their own personal or political ends; and it is intimated in intelligent political circles that the immediate friends of President Harrison are specially interested in keeping him before the public as an apparent candidate, knowing that he could not accept a nomination if tendered to him, and hoping to prevent other candidates from entering the field and acquiring formidable strength.

Mr Blaine has rendered great service to the country, and at no time has it been more conspicuous or more deserving of popular admiration than during his present Premiership. He was the only statesman of his party in the great contest for the revision of our tariff policy. But for his enlightened statesmanship and unflinching courage the McKinley bill would not have contained a single feature of reciprocity, and the party would have been entombed beyond the hope of resurrection. The one element of strength that now remains for the republican party in the next national contest, is Mr Blaine's reciprocity. Thus he saved his party from wrecking itself and he has been as eminent in diplomacy as he has been in statesmanship during his service in the present Cabinet. Let Mr Blaine have rest; let him have peace.—Phila. Times.

The politicians are for Hill or Gorman, but, outside of New York state, it is evident that the people of the democratic party are yet for Cleveland. Hill has it in his power to make democratic success almost assured by getting out of the way and advocating Cleveland's nomination. But the chances are that he won't.—Telegraph.

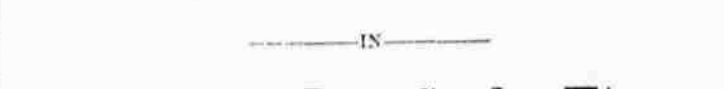

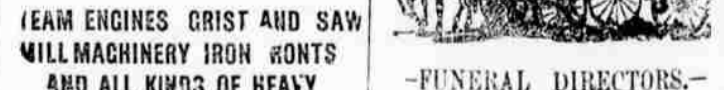
