One thing is very noticeable, and that is when any move is made on the political chess board that is calculated to diminish Mr Cleveland's chances of securing the nomination for the presidency, republicans are much pleased thereat. We are always pleased when we see the power of our most dangerous foe waning.

The man, who, after long years of earnest devotion to the democratic party, now leaves it to build up an incompatible third party, just at the very time when the democratic party is at the very threshold of power, will, in a very few months, be repenting in sackcloth and ashes for his grievous mistake. There is no mistake about the truth of this. It will be only history repeating itself.

People who read the reported interview with "Tony" Nolter in San Francisco in which he is reported to have said that he believed that Oregon would stand by General Palmer for the presidential nomination will wonder at just what point on his trip east he lost his head. General Palmer is a very good man, but no man 75 years old will ever be elected president of the United States. Besides General Palmer has said more than once that under no circumstances will he be a candidate but on the contrary he is an enthusiastic supporter of Mr Cleveland.

A dispatch from New York says: New York, Jan 28.—The coal-producing companies' agents, at a meeting today, made a general advance of 25 cents on the ton. This advance affects all grades of coal. The total production for February 1 was fixed at 2,500,000 tons. Now, do not read the above and pass on without giving it serious consideration. Read it again with grave concern and see if you can tell just what it means. Read it carefully again. Now, what do you make out of it? Just this: There is a duty on coal. This enables coal dealers to form a trust to control not alone the price of coal, but to limit the amount that shall be produced each month. Read again. "The total production for February 1 was fixed at 2,500,000 tons. This is what the robber scheme called "protection" enables coal producers to do. Advance the price of coal and then limit the production in order to keep prices up. Read again and reflect.

It turns out that the republicans, when they convened in Portland the other day, found a much larger and more realistic "mare's nest" than the democrats did when they held their state convention of clubs. The latter rather imagined that something of the kind existed, but the republicans found the most tangible proof of Ayer's scheme of self aggrandizement. That "advance report" which Ayer was going to send out to the rural press in order that he might be held up in a blaze of glory before the astonished gaze of the unsophisticated moss back republicans of the rural districts, unluckily for him, fell into the hand of a Philistine, if it be not sacrilegious to call Bro. Eddy by that eponymous name, and from thence the game was up. Ayer was no longer in it. He and McCannant were nothing short of interlopers. It was a hilariously noisy convention out-doing the democrats in that respect. But these rows are really healthy, and promote independence of thought among party men. Likewise they are death on "bosses."

Who will it? Wm F Harry, the Pennsylvania, member of the national democratic committee, being interviewed, tells about that he saw and heard at the meeting of the committee:

Speaking about presidential sentiment in the national committee Mr Harry said, "A large majority of the members, probably four fifths of the number, believe that Mr Cleveland will be and is the national candidate this year, and that tariff reform is the issue."

"This may not seem to be quite in keeping with the majority of the reports that burden the wires out from Washington nowadays, but it is the truth as far as my personal observation and contact with the committee members enabled me to form a correct judgment. The national democratic committee at Chicago next June 21, meets in Cleveland."

"I learn also that it is the belief of the majority of the committee that their states will send Cleveland delegations. There is nothing more certain respecting Pennsylvania, for the Cleveland sentiment never had stronger hold on the masses than it has today. And the Pennsylvania democracy are simply part of the great line now closing ranks once more for the cause of tariff reform. It is a battle cry that must be heeded, and the response will show that the will of the people is the party's final law."

"The presidential question, however, did not enter into the selection of place. I voted for Milwaukee, and I did so on the assurance of Senator Vilas and Governor Peck that Milwaukee had the accommodations necessary for a great and popular assembly, such as the democratic national convention is bound to be, and above other considerations was the one, Wisconsin is a doubtful state and it would have been good politics to send the convention to Milwaukee."

"There is a large and increasing element in Wisconsin that in late years has adopted independent tactics, and that element takes an intelligent view of democracy. We are reasonably certain to carry the state in any event, but the convention would have stimulated the workers and promoted assurance into undoubted certainty."

"Chicago is a natural convention city, of course, and has the hotels, the hall, the railroad accommodation and in fact everything to be desired. It has prestige also, for Cleveland was first nominated there in 1854, and the popular notion prevails that in Chicago everything goes because it must. The west and south, however, were determined to keep away from New York, and as the committee proceedings show, there was no liking even for Cincinnati, or Indianapolis. But one thing remained to be done. A centre upon which all the members could agree faced everybody and Chicago met the emergency as no place else could. Kansas City was considered too hot in summer. San Francisco was really never a serious thought. St Paul worked long and hard and so did Milwaukee, but—Chicago won. "I believe," continued Mr Harry, "that Chicago will witness the greatest convention outpouring in its history, and there have been some massive conventions held there."

"The democratic party is right back of Grover Cleveland as never before, and there is big promise that his will be the only name aloft when the delegations come up from over the Union to Chicago. "The sentiment is overwhelming for Mr Cleveland in Pennsylvania, and it has the same look in many other states."
