GOOD EVENING

MEMORIALIZED CONGRESS.—A meeting of the Albany Board of Trade was held this forenoon in the office of the President, G. W. Wright. Besides several of our prominent citizens Mr. Wm. N. Hoag, of the Oregon Pacific, was present. Extended resolutions were introduced, showing the necessity of completing the government work at Yaquina Bay, setting forth in plain language with the figures to back it, the resources of particularly the five adjoining counties, as well as the immense advantages that have occurred by reason of the Yaquina harbor in the shipment of grain by way of that seaport, and asking for a liberal appropriation. On motion of Judge Finn they were passed unanimously and were immediately forwarded to Washington. At a meeting of the Corvallis Board of Trade last evening strong resolutions were also passed. Congress should give a liberal appropriation at this time.

LUTHER BENSON FELL.—A few months ago Luther Benson returned in Albany on temperance. He was a magnetic, eloquent speaker, and here told how he had continually been unable to resist the drink habit, once a year falling before it. He returned east to his home in Indianapolis, and in a dispatch of Jan. 25 the result is told as follows: Luther Benson, having just returned from a temperance tour in Washington, Oregon and California, wound up a terrible drunken spree today and was taken to the Springfield Drunkard's Home for treatment. "When the tiger comes," says he, "I can no more resist the temptation than I can fly, and it comes about once a year. I see a real tiger, a tiger as natural as life. It appears before me. When I first see it, it is asleep, as peaceful as a lamb. In a little while it opens its eyes and looks about in a dreamy way. Then it begins to move and its eyes begin to glare at me. Pretty soon it begins to move its jaws and show its teeth. Then it springs at me, and with those great jaws around my neck, completely overpowers me. No one who meets that tiger can resist." Mr. Benson cried bitterly about his failure to resist the temptation.

THE ELEVENTH ANNIVERSARY of the organization of the Christian Endeavor society was observed by the union society in Albany yesterday. In the morning a well attended prayer meeting was held in the Presbyterian church. In the evening a public meeting was held at the Congregational church. It was a fruitful affair for those fortunate in being present. The president of the union, Miss Hattie Miller, gave a comprehensive review of the Christian Endeavor movement, how it started on Feb. 2, 1881, in the church of Rev. Frances E. Clark, in Portland, Me., merely as a local need, and had spread until it now consists of over 18,000 local societies and 1,100,000 members in different parts of the world. Short addresses were delivered by Revs. Prichard, Irvine, Cowden and Dobbins, full of inspiration for the endeavorers. A quartet consisting of Messrs. Prichard, Fortnall, Sears and Steele were heard in a song, also Rev. Prichard in a solo, besides several gospel songs.

DOESN'T LIKE THE IDEA.—The Corvallis Times says: "The Albany Herald is agitating the advisability of petitioning the next legislature to have the northwest corner of Benton county embracing about a township and a half, joined to Linn county. The reason, is, according to the Herald, that the county is naturally tributary to Albany and the residents would be benefited by being near the county seat. The scheme is ridiculous and only displays the vast amount of unutilized gull that can be crowded into a small space. Linn county is as large again as Benton already and this avareness spirit on the part of Albany shows a desire to covet the earth, but they ought not to undertake to nibble at death like a band of young ducks. Commerce fencing it without any ceremony."

AFTER 33 YEARS.—Another way to keep your name out of the paper is never to meet old friends. A pleasant case occurred in Albany yesterday, permitting of an item. Thirty-three years ago two young men named Dobbins and Cowden parted from each other at Jefferson University in Pennsylvania. In this city they met by accident for the first time since. Both are successful. Revs. Rev. Dobbins, of Oakland, Calif., as is well known has been working in the interest of the College, and Rev. Cowden, of Tacoma, Wash., in the revival meetings at the Christian church. The reunion has proven a very happy one.

SALMON'S B & L A.—The directors of the Salmon Building and Loan association met last night and loaned \$1,500 at eighty-five months' interest in advance. They also paid all the withdrawals, giving those who had been in eighteen months half the accrued profits, according to the last annual statement. The secretary was authorized to receive subscriptions to the stock of a new series, to be opened next month, in case there is a sufficient number desiring to take stock. The directors will probably deem 200 new shares sufficient. —Statesman.

BAND CONCERT.—The Second Regiment band of Salem has the reputation of being the best in Western Oregon. It is led to the capital city. This popular band, as already announced, will give a concert in Albany, Saturday night, preceded by first class vocal talent, and serves a full house.
