TELEGRAPHIC NEWS
More Judgeship Talk.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—It has been stated
before that there is no chance for Joseph
Simon to be circuit judge, and it was also
stated that the Oregon delegation submitted
to the president a communication highly
complimentary of Judge Lord, Mr. Ful-
ton and Mr. Watson, but it now appears
from sources which seem reliable, that
neither of these gentlemen can secure the
prize, and this morning Representative
Hermann received from various portions in
Oregon, chiefly from Portland, strong en-
dorsements for William B. Gilbert, of Port-
land, which he submitted to the attorney
general and who may possibly be appointed.
The Old Style.
PRESCOTT, A. T. Feb. 5.—A sensational re-
port reached here today from Verde Valley,
to the effect that two Indians passed yester-
day, going in the direction of San Carlos,
having in captivity a white girl, 16 years
old, whom they had stolen from near Flag-
staff. Captain Jackson, who brought word
to Prescott, is an old and reliable citizen of
this county.
He states the girl and her captors stopped
at a ranch and the girl was permitted to go
into the house to get something to eat, when
she told her story, imploring to be rescued.
As there is no one at the house except a
boy, he could render her no assistance.
Cheap Bonds.
CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—The county commis-
sioners decided today to issue bonds of
\$100,000 to fund the outstanding indebted-
ness. The bonds were bought by J. Y. Coff-
man, cashier of the First National bank at
face. They bear 5 1/4 per cent interest. The
sale is regarded as a good one, as only one;
as only one county in the state has sold its
bonds more advantageously.

A Railroad Subsidy.
ASTORIA, Feb. 5.—At a citizens' meeting
this afternoon, a committee was appointed
to get a subsidy of 1000 acres of land for
the Astoria and Columbia River Railway
Company to build a road fifty eight miles
from Astoria along the Columbia river to
Glabe, there to connect with the Northern
Pacific.
A Big Verdict.
NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Richard D. Alliger,
insurance broker, who sued the Mail and
Express for a libelous publication in Sep-
tember, 1887, in which he was charged with
having forged a check for \$1750, today se-
cured a verdict for \$8000, the heaviest ever
given against a newspaper in this city.
A Horseback Duel.
ELBORO, Ark. Feb. 5.—A duel on
horseback was fought near here last night
by S. C. Shaw and John Ballard, in which
the former was killed and the latter had his
horse shot from under him. The coroner's
jury rendered self-defense as the verdict.
An old feud caused the trouble.
