GOOD EVENING.

Tonight.—The 2nd Regiment band of Salem, with their concert company and friends arrived in Albany this noon, discharging some fine music on the streets at 2 o'clock. They will appear at the opera house tonight and deserve a good home. The Eugene Guard says of them: Eugene has a company belonging to the O. N. G. Our people are proud of company C. Our people are proud of the Second Regiment band. A well filled house greeted them at their first concert given last evening at Rhinehart's. A fine program was rendered, each soloist being called to respond to encores. The baritone singing of Mr. Ross in several solos was well received. The playing of the whole band evidenced careful and persistent training and the perfect time and harmony in the difficult pieces rendered, demonstrated that each player is capable of playing his own part well.

A Bold Tramp.—Philomath has had a sensation. A tramp entered the Chinese section-house out there the other day, and in the presence of the entire Celestial household, demanded all the loose change on the premises. Frightened at the verbal audacity of the bold and brazen highwayman, the bewildered Chinamen bowed in obedience to the request and handed over the hard earned sum of twenty-five dollars, without offering the least resistance. The tramp then hastened westward, going as far as Chittwood, where he held up another Chinaman, from whom he obtained \$100, a sum, in the mind of the maddened Mongolian, not to be picked up in the road every day. The tramp, following Horace Greeley's advice, continued to "go west," but was overtaken at Toledo Wednesday, and taken back to Philomath, where he is today undergoing the severe sentence of the punishment of law. He is a bold tramp, but the penitentiary will put a check on his plundering of pockets. —Corvallis Gazette.

The Red Bull.—The Salem Journal says: "Hurray for the Red Bull," referring to the mine in the Santiam District of that name. Salem people will do well to open their eyes and buy a mill at once. There is millions in the mine. The Journal speaking of the mine says: Harvey Massey, Amos Strong and Mr. Marsh of Keller & Marsh are the Salem owners of the Red Bull mine. It cost them \$150 to put a lot of ore through the mill, and it has yielded them a gold brick said to weigh out \$2300. The mine it is said is capable of yielding that every day. It creates not a little excitement in mining circles. The Silver Dollar mine is said to be sold for \$12,000.

Heir to a Fortune.—Another man has fallen heir to a fortune. His name is Isaac Wechsler, the well known commercial traveler, who passed through Albany Thursday night for San Francisco. An estate of \$1,500,000 was just left in Austria, and he is to get a slice. His fortune descended from Mathias Pulitzer, archbishop of Vienna, who was a member of one of the most distinguished Hebrew families of Hungary. Joseph Pulitzer, the famous proprietor of the New York World, is a relative of Mr. Wechsler and one of the heirs to the money. There is no telling how big the drummer's share will be when he gets it. Such things are so visionary when they are first reported.

SPOTS & MUMMIES.—The Pendleton E. O. tells of the following very peculiar robbery: Some months ago some curiosities in the shape of mummified Indians were taken from the Indian grave yard at Long Island, on the Columbia river, near Umatilla. One, the remains of an Indian child about twelve years old, was presented to Dr. Smith, of this city. He left it in a room in the Thompson & Black building, and contemplated sending it to a medical college in the east. A few weeks ago, when he took Will Hall Poore of the Irrigation Age to view the curiosity, the mummy turned up missing. Recently a pale, black-eyed young man who had a boot-black stand at the Pantheon, left the city. Later it was discovered by the officers that the young man, whose name is George E. Deletts, was negotiating for the sale of an Indian mummy at Portland for the handsome sum of \$500. So Deputy Sheriff Bailey, who went to Salem with prisoners, cornered the bootblack and will bring him back on this evening's train.

E. R. Lecky Missing.—The Telegram of last evening says: The mystery concerning the whereabouts of Captain E. R. Lecky and W. M. Wisloman has not yet been cleared up before another man has disappeared as though swallowed by the earth. The missing man this time is Henry R. Luckey, of Eugene, a very well-known man in that section, who came down to this city on Monday last, and went to the Perkins hotel. He registered, and was assigned to room 313, but said at the time he would not occupy it that night. He said he would return on Tuesday morning, and merely registered to let his friends know he was in town. His cousin Mrs. S. S. Spencer, went to the hotel to see if he was there, and was alarmed to find out that he had not returned. The police were notified, and have been looking for him, but as yet without success. Mrs. Luckey will come down to this city today to aid, if possible, in the search for her husband.

ALBANY'S 125 UNOCCUPIED HOUSES tells the story of inflated values. If Linn county had Corvallis within her confines, the people of Albany could at least boast of having one solid city in that county. —Benton Leader.

The Leader man could not begin to find 125 empty houses in Albany, in fact very few, no more than always in a city of the size of Albany. The truth is considerable hunting has to be done to get a desirable house to rent. We have already the most solid town in Oregon outside of Multnomah county. Values are solid here, as one would learn on buying inside property. Albany was never in a more flourishing condition, and the confidence in it is increasing among her citizens.

Judge Stocker, Commissioners Simpson and Gibson, Thursday morning made the county tax levy, 10 mills. Taking the school, state and county tax, the entire levy will be 20 mills. This is lower tax than any other county in the state. —Polk county Observer.

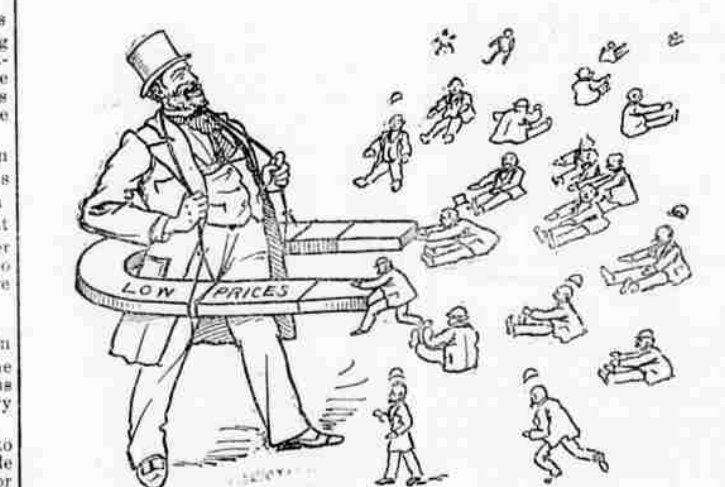
