GOOD EVENING

A SAILOR BOY.—This noon a young man in full sailor uniform such as is worn on all U. S. steamers, arrived in Albany from Yaquina Bay, having come to that city on the Willamette Valley, on his way from San Francisco to Walla Walla. On his cap were the words "U. S. S. Galileo." That would attract attention anywhere these days, that being the steamer the sailors for which had been attacked in Valparaiso, over which so much smoke was caused. A despatcher man met the young man just as he was starting to board the Portland train. He said that he left Chilli six weeks ago, that affairs looked pretty stormy there for awhile. He reported Chilians generally down on the regent and that they were anxious for his recall, which simply confirms general reports. Already our people are full of Chilian affairs and most of them tired of it; but a real live man direct from the seat of war is not seen every day, hence the interest taken in this particular sailor boy, whose general appearance stamped him as being genuine, but what he is doing on his way to Walla Walla is an enigma.

AN OCTOGENARIAN DEAD.—The Station Times says. Wednesday morning, February 3rd, 1892, Mrs. Susan Crabtree died at her home five miles south of Station, in her 82 year. In the death of Mrs. Crabtree this community loses another estimable pioneer lady. Deceased was born in Hopkins county, Kentucky, February 14th, 1810, and married in the same state to Washington Crabtree in 1831. In the year 1836 they emigrated and settled in Cedar county, Missouri, from thence in 1853 to the state of Oregon, where they have since resided. Mrs. Crabtree became a member of the church of Christ in the year 1855 and until her death lived a consistent christian life. Her dying words were, "No more water until I shall drink the water of life over yonder." Deceased leaves a husband and three children, one of whom has always lived with his parents, and the other two, Mrs. A. J. Richardson and J. C. Crabtree, reside here.

A GUN ACCIDENT.—Another man has been shot without knowing how it happened. The Statesman says: Yesterday W. W. Nichols, who lives just this side of Howell prairie in the timber, near Dick Swarts' mill, accidentally discharged a gun he was handling and as a result lost his right eye and hand. Mr. Nichols had been hunting and was standing talking with some friends. He held the loaded shotgun in his hands and by some means the weapon was discharged. He does not know how it happened, but it is supposed he may have touched the trigger with his foot, or that a stick may have touched it. The shot struck him in the right hand, shattering the wrist. It also filled his arm and the right side of his face with shot. His right eye was also struck and he has lost the sight of it.

STILL MISSING.—E. R. Lucky, of Eugene, is still missing. The Guard says there are these theories: 1st, that he has been murdered and robbed, as he carried a handsome gold watch and wore a fine diamond ring, and was known to be a man of wealth; 2d, that he has become temporarily deranged and wandered away. He has been ill with the grip for the past month and had not yet entirely recovered; 3d, that he left the country to avoid meeting his creditors. Evidently the last theory prevails in Eugene for an attachment was made on his property Saturday as follows: First National Bank, \$4,685; Eugene National Bank, \$2,950; Lane County Bank, \$3,948; F. B. Dunn, \$750; total, \$12,333, and it is reported he owes considerable besides.

THE BAND CONCERT.—A small but appreciative audience attended the concert given by the 2nd Regiment band of Salem Saturday evening, at the opera house. An absence of members of the regiment was particularly noticeable. The entertainment was a very meritorious one. The band is an efficient one in every respect. Prof. Coomer is undoubtedly the best cornetist in Oregon, and was heartily cheered in his solo. The tuba and euphonium solos were both extra and Mr. H. Ross was encored in a vocal solo. As a musical entertainment of its peculiar character it is a marked success, though it is not of the nature to draw big crowds.

PAYING TAXES.—Sheriff Scott is receiving taxes under the new equalization act completed as ordered by the state board of equalization. A number liquidated today, one farmer handing \$200 over the county. The heaviest individual tax payer in the county under the act is Mr. S. E. Young, who will pay on 26,553, an increase of about \$3000 by the recent order. As the collection has been begun late payment should be rapid enough to make up for the delay.

A GENERAL SKIP OUT

A social sensation in the vicinity of Albany is the report that Mr. Jas. Wallace, a well-known farmer, has left the city for California with a Mrs. Veatch, a daughter of W. W. McCoon, leaving his wife and four children to shift for themselves, taking with him \$1350 received for his wheat last week. Personal property owned by him has been attached for about \$1000 by local creditors. The case is an unfortunate one. Mr. Wallace rented the Goltra farm, a few miles from Albany, and has stood well in the community. Mr. J. B. Thompson, of the Lebanon hotel, arrived in Albany Sunday on his way home from a trip to Texas, and reports having met Mr. Wallace at the depot in Red Bluff, Calif. He had just come from Redding, where Mrs. Veatch was stopping, and also W. W. McCoon, wife and son, all having left Albany together. McCoon is also reported to be in debt considerably and his absence will not be much of a loss to the community. Mrs. Wallace, an estimable woman, was in the city this forenoon, and takes the affair very much to heart. Mr. Wallace was a man about 45 years of age, and has two married children and two not married. Mrs. Veatch's husband who resided at Colburg, died about two years ago, and since then the relationship between her and Mr. Wallace is reported to have been of an uncertain nature.

An effort is being made to arrest McCoon on the charge of selling property on which there was a chattel mortgage, in August he having given a chattel mortgage in favor of H. F. Merrill and C. H. Stewart, on property, which he is reported to have sold, for \$250. S. E. Young also holds a chattel mortgage for \$193. In the case of Wallace the attachments were issued by Knapp Burrell & Co. and two by Isom, Lanning & Co. The case is becoming quite complicated.
