

THE WOOL AND WOOLEN TARIFF BILL.

The democratic members of the ways and means committee have agreed upon the following reduction of duties on woolen manufacturers:

"On woolen and worsted yarns 35 per cent; the rate under the McKinley law is 35 and 40 per cent on woolen or worsted cloths. Shawls, knit fabric and all fabrics made on knitting machines or frames, and all manufactures of every description made wholly or in part of wool, or worsted, not specially provided for, 40 per cent, the present rates being 40 and 50 per cent, according to the value. On blankets, hats, wool and flannels for underwear, composed wholly or in part of wool, valued at not more than 50 cents per pound, 25 per cent, against a present duty under the McKinley law of 50 per cent ad valorem, valued at more than 30 cents per pound, and not more than 50 cents, 30 per cent ad valorem, against a present rate of 35 per cent, valued at more than 50 cents per pound, 35 per cent against a present rate of 40 per cent ad valorem. On women's and children's dressgoods, coatings, bunnings and goods of similar description, 35 per cent against a duty under the McKinley bill of 50 per cent. Clothing ready made and articles of wearing apparel of every description, cloaks, dolmans, jackets, and other outside garments for ladies and children, 45 per cent ad valorem, against the McKinley rate of 60 per cent. On webbing, goring, suspender braces, belt-ings, bindings, braids, galloons, fringes, gimps cords, cords and tassels, dress trimmings, laces and embroideries, buttons, head nets, 40 per cent ad valorem, against the present rate of 60 per cent. On carpets of all descriptions, carpets, carpetings, mats, rugs, screens, covers, art squares and other portions of carpets, 30 per cent, against the present rate of 40 per cent on all except carpets and carpetings, not specially provided for, which is placed at 50 per cent under the McKinley law."

In addition to these reductions on ad valorem duties, the committee has decided to remove all the specific duties being the per pound and per square yard duties which, under the McKinley law, constitute nearly one half of the present duties on woolens. The average rate of duty under this proposed new law would be about 36 to 37 per cent as compared with 91 per cent under the present law. Here, now, would be a law in the interest of the masses of the people, the consumers. No man in favor of fair dealing can oppose it.

The treatment in the protection organs of this nation's "commercial progress" is characteristic. They claim the credit of the increased exports due chiefly to short crops abroad coincident with large crops here. And having passed a law accordingly to curtail imports—to "prevent the flooding of the home markets with the products of foreign labor"—they now have the roolness to boast of "merchandise imports into the United States much the largest in value ever known in any calendar year." The paradoxes of protection are stupendous.

A correspondent at Atlanta, Georgia has interviewed 1293 prominent democrats of all parts of Georgia as to presidential preferences. Of that number, 849 want Cleveland, while only 277 declare for Hill, the others scattering.

The tax on wool has never done anybody any good in this country, and it has done everybody harm. But any bill for free wool must cut squarely in half the taxes on clothing and all other forms of woolens. This is the kind of reciprocity democrats are most interested in now.

The democrats of the country have already done all the resolving and declaring that are necessary in regard to the "worse-than-war-tariff." What they elected congress for was to act. "Fine words butter no parsnips," and fine resolutions reduce no taxes.

A few days ago the legislature of Maryland passed a resolution expressing a sense that the national house of representatives should act upon the tariff question in harmony with President Cleveland's message of 1887 and the Mills bill.

Reed, he of car fame, is very anxious to go as a delegate to the national republican convention. Blaine and his man Friday, (Manley,) have determined that he shall not go. The fight will be a pretty one.
