In the first district, Bilyeu, Weatherford, Myers, Veatch and Hayes of Oswego are discussed. The republicans talk of Hermann, Miller, Tongue, Wolverton, Geer and others.

A strange death is reported from New Orleans. It is said that while playing a hose upon a fire a telephone wire and an electric-light wire got crossed, the stream of water from the nozzle struck the wires, a heavy current followed down the water, and killed the fireman who was holding the nozzle.

Few men in Oregon are better or more favorably known than Colonel James K. Kelly. For several years past Colonel Kelly has made his home in Washington, D. C. A report has been received here that he is rapidly falling in health. The news will be received with severe regret by thousands of Colonel Kelly's friends all over the county. He is one of the early pioneers of Oregon, and bore a distinguished part in the early Indian wars. For many years he occupied a leading position at the bar in this state, and has also served a term as United States senator from Oregon. Colonel Kelly was for a number of years a resident of Portland. —Telegram.

First, by neglecting his official duties to manipulate political wires.

Second, by seeking the nomination for president of the United States as one might seek a nomination for alderman, and

Third, by persisting in a course which has received universal condemnation and which he must know to be ruinous.

All these things are counting against Senator Hill more than he realizes. —New York World.

THE COAL TRUST.

The anthracite coal trade has always been a practical monopoly. The mines have been owned by different corporations and individuals, but the large and controlling interests have been operated by a combination. This combination has done about what pleased it. It has regulated prices by limiting the output or by arbitrarily fixing the price. It has even controlled coal-yards and through them has increased the cost of fuel to the consumer.

The power of monopoly has been greatly increased and strengthened by the recent lease to the Reading Railroad Company of the Lehigh Valley and New Jersey Central Railroads, and the acquisition by the same corporation of a controlling interest in the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad.

This combination is most threatening to the interests of the coal consumers of the country. It is intimated that the profits of the coal operators will be greatly increased by the economies which will be introduced in the management of the properties, but there is also a little subtler gleam over the thought that a rise of 25 cents a ton would immensely increase the profits of the coal pool.

It is also true that an increase of price, even if only 25 cents, would cause great suffering to the poor, for such an increase to the wholesale dealers adds dollars to the price paid by the consumer. The establishment of this new coal combination or trust, greater than any that has preceded it, ought to result in some kind of legislative relief for the consumer. Cheap coal means warmth and health, and it is against these that the trust strikes.

That such an outrageous assault upon the people is possible is due to our long-forevered tradition that the enactment of laws for the enrichment of the rich is one of the chief functions of legislative bodies.

GOV. BOIES'S SPEECH.

Gov. Boies's speech before the Grey-stone club of Denver, Col., printed in the World to-day, has the true ring of democracy. Its subject was "The Democracy in 1892," and the address itself was an enunciation of the principles that were laid down by Jefferson at the beginning of the government and that have endured ever since.

It is the man who, like Thomas Jefferson, has within his heart and brain the utmost trust and confidence in the people who is the best democrat. Gov. Boies is evidently one of the very best. He understands the situation. He sees the government in the hands of a rich oligarchy whose wealth sustains the republican party and corrupts the voters, and on the other side he sees the people struggling for a larger share in the distribution of the wealth which their own industry has created.

He says it is the mission of the democracy in 1892 to struggle for an opportunity to "divide the mighty currents that are emptying the wealth of this nation into the hands of a few men and scatter their golden contents among those who produce it."

Gov. Boies is one of the men that "Democracy in 1892" has its eye upon. —New York World.

The national democratic leaders must expect a tedious time at the nominating convention in Chicago, as they have chosen the longest day in the year to hold the national convention. But they will not be able to ballot often enough to nominate David B. Hill, although this was evidently the object. —Corvallis Times.
