WHERE'S THE COLONEL?—The following from the Oregonian makes the O. P. case begin to assume a sensational tone, though it is a sound ring to the last part of it: Receiver Hogg, of the Oregon Pacific, took a special train for the south Wednesday night, but what because of his nobility seems to be able to find out. Deputy Marshal Sloan looked all over town for Hogg Wednesday, and Deputy Marshal Gregg spent all day yesterday at Corvallis on the same errand. It is thought that Hogg wants to effect his transfer of the road before he can be served with the injunction papers. It is given out that the new management has ordered work to begin on the Eastward extension. The prospect of this road being completed to Eastern connections is one more alarming, if possible, than those which threaten existing lines from new projections to the northward. Excepting the crossing of the Cascades, the Oregon Pacific would have an almost level roadbed from Corvallis to the Rockies, effecting a system which would be very cheaply operated. It promises to be a disturbing element in the trans-continental situation.

A SAMPLE.—The following from the Oregon City Courier is a good example of the way men evade paying taxes in Oregon, regardless of politics: Capt J. T. Apperson is evading a great deal of interest in the western road, for the purpose of expending taxpayers' money of the new Molalla road, and also takes a leading part in preparing the slate for the republican county convention. As he did not pay one cent of tax last year, and it is said, has no tax to pay under the tax roll of 1891, it is surprising that the republicans of Clackamas allow themselves to be led by a man that claims to be a head and flows in debt though he has a salary of \$10 a day. (It is said on the side that he is worth \$100,000.) In getting the valiant captain out of the dilemma of paying any tax a very unique and uncommon entry was made for his special benefit in the mortgage tax roll of 1891. Holding a mortgage for \$11,150, the assessor credited him in the list of mortgages with \$5070 and on the remaining \$5580 the assessor that bought his farm pays the tax. Ye gods and little fishes republicans of Clackamas county, behold your baited leader!

WATERLOO.—T. L. Rice and wife have returned to Waterloo and have leased the hotel owned by J. G. Gross, and seem to prefer panning dishes to panning for gold. Mr. Rice has been engaged to teach the school here.

W. C. Davis, president of the W. C. company, arrived here on the 15th, last, and commenced the work of developing by selling three choice lots to Mr. Miner of Benton county. The consideration being \$1200.

This morning work was commenced on the ditch and foundation of the factory, a building of no mean proportions, being 128 feet and 8 inches in length, 58 feet wide and 2½ stories in height. Some fifteen men and several teams are employed at present and more will be added shortly. —Advance.

WENT TO ST. LOUIS.—Prof Rork, of Salem, has just left that city for the St. Louis reform conference. The following from the Journal sounds very much as if it had been written by the Prof himself: The conference is made up of delegates from all reform forces. Its business is to determine if there shall be another great national party composed of all those who believe in a government of the people, for the people to the end that labor shall have its dues. Prof Rork goes as Oregon's representative of the National Alliance, so he will not only speak for the Oregon Alliance but also for the National Alliance. He says he can be depended upon to vote for the abolition of banks of issue by which the banker loans his debt at 10 per cent interest while the farmer pays 10 per cent on his debts, for the government ownership of railroads, for graduated taxation, for government loan of money on any good security at a rate so low as to relieve those mortgaged and to force capital out of loaning on crushing interest into business, giving employment to the unemployed, for the sub-treasury to break gold cornering and to furnish a variable volume of money equal to the varying volume of business, and for pure government whisky at cost without drinking places.
