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Black Teas. The black and pan-dried Japan teas, as well as the China teas that may be included under the general heading of "black teas," get their color from the firing or roasting process, but mineral coloring matter is also frequently used to give a certain desired commercial appearance. The firing and the coloring, as in the green teas, largely conceal the identity of the tea, and permit the use of the very cheapest tea, to argue nothing for the desecrating effect of excessive firing, which must be resorted to when a very cheap product is used and an extreme color desired.
