The third or people's party of Linn county has been called to meet at Lebanon on the 5th of March 1892, to nominate a county ticket.

The most of a catbird, living in New South Wales, is described by Mr. North as a beautiful structure, "being bowl shaped, and composed extensively of long twigs entwined around the large, broad leaves of 'Pteridia' and other broad leaved trees. The leaves appear to have been plucked when green, and the interior of the nest is lined entirely with fine twigs. Although included among the bower birds, the catbird has not been known to make a bower.

The Pennsylvania courts have decided that clubs are not exempt from license fees provided they dispose of liquors. The high license policy adopted two or three years ago led to an enormous increase in clubs organized mainly for drinking purposes. The decision is a victory not only for temperance, but for liquor dealers who have paid their license fees, and who are thereby entitled to protection from the illegal competition of those who have not done so.

A dispatch from St. Louis says: President Ben Terrill, of the Confederation of Industrial Organizations, will on Monday morning, in the exposition building, call to order the largest and most important convention of workmen ever held in this country. There will represent delegates from nearly all if not every state in the union, representing the National Farmers' Alliance and Industrial Union, Knights of Labor, Colored Farmers' Alliance, Patrons of Husbandry, Patrons of Industry, National Citizens' Alliance, and other organizations of similar character. The convention will decide the question as to whether or not there will be in the coming presidential campaign a third-party ticket with strength enough behind it to affect sensibly the fight between the two great parties. This convention is the outgrowth of action taken at the Ocala meeting of the National Farmers' Alliance, in December, 1891. It was then decided to move for a closer union between the great industrial organizations of the country, and as a result a meeting was held in Washington in January, 1892, at which were represented the National Farmers' Alliance, Colored Farmers' Alliance, the Citizens' Alliance and the Knights of Labor, and the Confederation of Industrial Organizations was formed. This body called Monday's convention for the purpose of deciding on the ways and means of forcing the passage of laws putting into effect the principles of Ocala platform.

THE PROTESTING DEMOCRATS.

The nomination of David B. Hill by the democratic convention at Chicago is now an absolute impossibility.

Few are so blind as to fail to recognize this fact. Whatever might have been possible under the conditions prevailing a few months ago - Mr Hill's boldness and conspicuous talent as a manager have gained him many admirers - the situation is now entirely changed.

This change has been brought about by Mr Hill himself. The people have not been turned from him by the machinations of his rival. He himself, by the methods which he has chosen to advance his political ambition, has aroused an opposition which forbids the party to make him its candidate if it expects to preserve its unity.

The meeting in New York City last evening certified to this fact in a very emphatic manner. Such a demonstration, conducted by such men, encouraged by such journals, as the World, is without precedent in the democratic party.

It shows that in his own state he has aroused the antagonism of the men who make the strength of the democracy, and that, whatever his "stap convention" may do in his behalf, it cannot be accepted as the voice of the democrats of New York.

No candidate can go before the convention at Chicago in such shape with the expectation of controlling its action.

Senator Hill may be counted out of the contest. - Boston Post.

The Washington correspondent of the Examiner has been figuring on the number of democrats in the house who will vote against free coinage when it comes up. In New England there will be 14; New York 21; Pennsylvania 5; New Jersey 4; Maryland 5; Ohio 3; Indiana 2; Illinois 6; Wisconsin 2; Delaware 1; Minnesota 3; Michigan 2; Iowa 2; Missouri 2; Kentucky 2; South Carolina 2; Alabama 2; Texas 1; California 2. This makes a total of 99. There are a number of others who he feels sure will vote against the measure. Many of these will vote against it as a matter of policy, desiring to settle the matter of tariff legislation first. It will take 167 votes to carry the measure. There are 27 republicans in the house, and the highest estimate in the house of those who will vote for it is ten. This would make the matter about a tie. The friends of free coinage would make much greater progress if they would do what the country expects them to do, give the tariff the open road this session and take up silver in the next.
