SENATOR HILL OPENING HIS EYES.

It will be remembered that when congress convened last December there were two views among democrats as to the best policy to be pursued in reference to tariff legislation. One line of policy proposed was to formulate an entirely original tariff bill covering all the ground of tariff legislation, while another line was proposed which consisted in attacking the McKinley law in detail, in its weakest points. On the 5th of December Senator Hill made a speech at Elmira, New York, which he said he had prepared after much thought and deliberation. In speaking of the two policies of tariff legislation as outlined above, he took strong grounds against that of attacking the McKinley law in detail, and declared in favor of an entire repeal of the McKinley bill, and a return to the tariff law of 1883. For this he was severely criticized by nearly every democratic paper in the country. Here is what he said:

Shall we break our party formation and go to pieces in debating some small amendments towards taxation for revenue only, or some confusing details of scandalous tariff schedules; or shall we rather voice a great people's rebuke of the two McKinley acts and demand their repeal?

Shall we nibble at rates and percentages as if that were the size of our quarrel with republican revolutionists, or shall we simply vote to repeal the two McKinley acts and to destroy the bounty and subsidy system root and branch?

Then he was much opposed to offering "small amendments" such as one to put wool on the free list and reducing the duties on wools to a mere nominal rate, another to put binding twine on the free list, another to put cotton ties on the free list as is now being done by Springer and the ways and means committee.

The speech created general surprise at the time and among other things the DEMOCRAT in the issue of January 1, 1892 said:

It is a matter of great surprise to not only those who support the governor for the democratic nomination, but to those who would have Ex-president Cleveland or some other man, that he should take a position so negative, so do-nothing, so patently untenable on the very face of it.

The senator has evidently been devoting some attention to the subject, and has given it that searching investigation that the importance of the subject demands, and the DEMOCRAT is much pleased to be able to chronicle a radical change of opinion on the part of the senator. At the recent New York state convention he was called upon to make a speech, and in the midst of his triumph he said:

"The cause of tariff reform has lately made great practical advances. Secretary Manning, in his report of 1886, advised congress to begin a practical tariff reform by a single act—an act for free wool. One year later the secretary's report was 'well-laid' in the message of the president. Now, five years later, one of the most enlightened economists, David A. Wells, writes the chairman of the ways and means committee that the path of progress which Secretary Manning blazed first and alone is the true path. It is a matter of sound policy, better fitted to win elections than lose them, better dividing into chapters the lessons of a long campaign of education. Abolish whenever you can one indefensible tax at a time. This is true progress."

Now, the senator is no longer afraid of "little amendments and in the brilliancy of the light" that has come to him by research he exclaims in sound democratic tones: "Abolish whenever you can one indefensible tax at a time." Well, said senator. We are truly pleased to see the senator add another to the many fitnesses which he already possesses to become a great democratic leader.

OUR POSITION.

As has been before stated in these columns, the DEMOCRAT regards the issue upon which a man runs for president as far more important than the candidate himself. Not a single democratic of those whose names have been mentioned in connection with the presidency Cleveland, Bland, Carlisle, Whitney, Palmer, Penney, Patterson, Russell, Gorman, Gray, Vilas, Hill, Flower and others but would be far preferable, if on a square-topped tariff reduction platform than any republican on a "protection" platform. The DEMOCRAT entertains not the slightest fear as to what the platform of the national democratic convention will be on the great vital issue of tariff reduction. Hence it is safe to say that the DEMOCRAT will heartily support either one of the distinguished leaders above named if nominated. But this fact does not preclude the DEMOCRAT from urging the nomination of one in preference to others. This we will do without regard to criticisms of other newspapers that think such a course should not be pursued.

Graves Cleveland went to Ann Arbor yesterday and delivered an address before the faculty and students of the University on the subject, "Sentiment in 'Our National Life.'" He was met at the depot by 2000 students. The Mayor of the city presented Mr. Cleveland with the freedom of the city in a silver casket.

McKinley gave the woolen manufacturers about 50 per cent advantage over the wool grower when arranging the duties on wool and woolens. Springer gives the woolen manufacturers 35 per cent advantage and still the *Oregonian* specials.

It is said that the friends of Hill in Indiana are joining with the friends of Gray to secure a delegation instructed for Gray for president and finally to go to Hill.

RHODE ISLAND COMING.

The democratic state convention of Rhode Island to elect delegates to the national democratic convention will be held in Providence March 2, the same day that the state ticket is selected.

"Amherst, Bristol, Warren and East Providence have elected delegates favorable to the nomination of Cleveland. In this town the delegation will be solid for Cleveland. Scituate, Foster, Gloucester and a few towns in the section where Congressman Page lives may send Hill delegates.

If the convention were held today Cleveland would capture every delegate, and there is little doubt that nine-tenths of the delegates will be for Cleveland.

Mayor Daniel A. Pond, of Woonsocket, will be the choice for governor by a large majority and will probably carry the state. The democrats also hope to elect their legislative tickets and county officers at the state election, which will be held the first Monday in April.

The democrats have made a clean gain of over six thousand in the state registration. Take from this the supposed gain of the republican electors on property and other qualifications and they will still have a net gain of 4000 and over. There is good reason to believe that the new legislature will be democratic in both branches, and the democrats confidently expect to elect their state ticket by clean majorities. Only a plurality is needed for presidential electors.

Among the democrats who would like to go to the United States senate are: ex-Gov. John W. Davis, Congress Oscar Lapham, of the First district, and Charles H. Page, of the Second district; Samuel H. Mayor of Newport; Hugh G. Carroll, mayor of Pawtucket; and Thomas McGuire, Jr. of this town. One plan is to send Congressman Page to the senate and elect Thomas McGuire, of this place, to his seat in congress.

The delegates-at-large to the national convention will probably be: Mayor Samuel R. Honey, of Newport, Mayor Daniel S. Pond of Woonsocket, and possibly ex-Gov. Davis, of Pawtucket, and Congressman Oscar Lapham.
