LITERARY ENTERTAINMENT.—A public meeting of the literary society of the Albany public school was held last evening, being attended by a good number of parents and friends of the school. The following officers have been elected for the ensuing term of the society: Victor Moses, president; Margarette Hopkins, vice president; Aloysius Milner, secretary; Nellie Blodgett, treasurer; Kate Scholer, secretary of program.

WHAT IS IN IT.—A brother has asked the Democrat what there is in the report about a new hotel and opera house to cost \$50,000, and to be known as the "Hotel Albany." As nearly as we can learn from good authority, a gentleman on his own responsibility has drawn plans showing a handsome structure, but there is no backing to it at present, nor likelihood of such a structure for at least a few years, though there is no question it would be a credit to the city. The Democrat is in favor of the truth, but believes the city can get; but the truth is the hotel business is filled in this city, with our present population, in a splendid manner. The universal verdict of the traveling public is that Albany has the best managed hotels in Oregon, outside of Portland, and their capacity has not yet begun to be tested.

A BIRD SUE.—The following from the Eugene Guard tells about a suit in which two well known men are interested, the plaintiff recently being in the insane asylum. The defendant is a brother of Alfred Wheeler of this city. The suit on the face of it looks decidedly fishy. This morning B. J. Pengra instituted a suit in the circuit court against Almon Wheeler for the sum of \$4,181. The items for which the plaintiff sues the defendant are made up as follows: \$2,500 for rent; \$2,575 for use of water; \$24 for rent of land; \$500 for damages to waste, wear and tear at mill; \$250 damages to head gate and banks of race; \$500 damages to main dam; \$1,000 for damages in wasting water; \$1,000 for use of race in holding saw logs; \$500 damages to race in holding saw logs. Attorneys L. Blyden, A. C. Woodcock, of Eugene, and Geo. H. Williams, of Portland, appear for Mr. Pengra.

DIVORCE GRANTED.—Yesterday the supreme court rendered a decision in the case of Paul Cason, of this city, against his wife, for divorce, reversing the judgment of the lower court, and awarding a decree of divorce to the plaintiff, the defendant to have the custody of the two minor children and the plaintiff to pay \$20 a month for the support of the defendant. Weatherford & Blyden were attorneys for the plaintiff and appellant, and Montanye and Watson for the defendant and respondent. The case has excited considerable interest.

COOK TO HIS HEAD.—The Salem Journal tells the following in which a former Albany man was close to a flying bullet: Near 8 o'clock last night a shot was fired from somewhere on the east side of Commercial street, striking the plate glass of Klein's shoe store and badly shattering the same. The ball perforated the heavy glass, scattering glass all over the inside show window. When the shot was fired Mr. Klein was sweeping directly in front of the window and the bullet may have been aimed at him, but he has no knowledge of anyone having a grudge against him.

A BRICK LIVERY STABLE.—Mr. E. F. Sox is making arrangements to build a large brick stable, two stories, 50x100 feet, on his property on Second street just east of the opera house. It will have a handsome business front and be so constructed that at any time it can be transformed into stores. Straney & Moore, now doing business on Fourth street will occupy it on a long lease, and run a metropolitan livery stable, with the best rigs to be secured.

COUNCIL PROCEEDING

Tuesday evening, Feb. 25. Present—Mayor, recorder, marshal, street superintendent, treasurer, and Comptroller French, Stewart, Pfeiffer, Wheeler, Burdick and Hawkins. The following bills were ordered paid: J. N. Hoffman, \$5.50; Fritz Bender, \$2; Robert Brown, \$2; C. Bender, \$2; Lear & Livingston, \$3; Thos. Boney, \$2.35; N. J. Hendon, \$2.45; Ben Johnson, \$2.50; Houdine Bros., \$1.50; Robt. Murphy, \$6; M. Cowan, \$8.25.

In matter of petition of J. E. Bridgeford and others for a foot bridge across the ditch, west side of Broadway street the same was granted and ordered built. New sidewalks were ordered built as recommended by street commissioner.

In matter of nuisance in block 31, town 1, north range of Wm. Meyer, the committee reported that no nuisance existed and petition was denied.

Further time was granted on petition of Wm. Kallstrom and others for eastern. Recorder reported on matter of assessments for lateral sewers, giving reasons of certain property owners for not doing work. Time extended for building sewers until March 8.

Petition of Klein Bros. and others, reported they had contracted with E. E. Parker for sprinkling streets, and asked that city make contract with him for sprinkling squares. Referred.

Petition of E. W. Achison and others asked that grade adjoining their property be changed to conform to established grade. Referred.

Petition of L. E. Blain and others, asked that wooden awnings and swinging awnings be removed from First street. Remonstrance to same signed by T. L. Wallace & Co., P. Cohen and others was read. Both referred to committee on streets and public property.

Jack Sandner, of Hequiam, Wash., objected to new sidewalk adjoining his lot as it was the last one traveled. Filed. Ordinance No. 243 in reference to levying assessments, being the old ordinance recommended to conform to the new charter, was read three times and passed.

Resolution for improving east side of Calapan streets, 7th to 8th, and south side of 7th, Lyon to Baker, by new sidewalks, was adopted.

Objection was made to six foot walks on the ditch street, by Mr. Greenhault, A. H. Martin and others. The committee on ordinances was directed to prepare ordinance allowing a four foot walk on ditch streets.

Bonds of F. A. Reis & Co., Casper Vondran, August F. Kurel, Harper Cranor and Herman Burlew were read and licenses were granted to sell liquor. Hayne & Buck were given 15 days in which to clean up Madison street.

The matter of flume on Broadalbin street was referred.

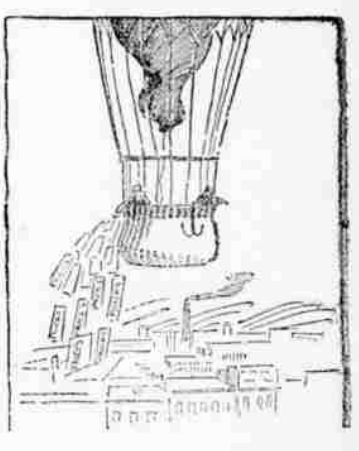
