Candidates for county offices are getting ripe. Some of them will be pulled before many moons.

It is highly probable that the democrats will take the advice long since given by Horace Greeley, and go west, for a presidential candidate.

The democrats of the lower house had a caucus Thursday night for the purpose of attempting to come to some agreement as to the course to be pursued with reference to the silver question. After considerable discussion the caucus adjourned with nothing done.

A third party paper urges people to vote against candidates pledged to represent class interests. This is good, wholesome advice but the organ overlooked the fact that in giving such advice it was advising voters to vote against the salutary scheme, for no more purely class legislation was ever proposed than that scheme.

Now, as a matter of fact, if the national democratic convention which meets in Chicago on the 21st day of June A D 1892, should in their wisdom fix it up this way, For President, Horace Boies, of Iowa

For Vice President R P Flower, of New York

Then, indeed, with such leaders, we could march on to victory.

The third party convention at St Louis appointed a committee to make a call for a third party convention to nominate a national ticket. The committee has selected Omaha, Nebraska, as the place and July the 14th as the time for holding the convention. As the convention refused to endorse prohibition and woman's suffrage another convention will be held in St Louis June 29 to nominate prohibition candidates for president and vice-president.

It is just as important that democrats should select a candidate who can carry Indiana, West Virginia, Connecticut, and Virginia as one who can carry New York. In other words 36 electoral votes in other states are just as necessary as the thirty six in New York. Hence we are not to consult New York alone. It is high time that the democracy of the country should assert its equality with the democracy of New York. We can afford to love both Cleveland and Hill, but we can not afford to love the presidency when it is in our grasp. Let us round up the number of the days of the bosses.

Let every democrat bear in mind that his party has not been responsible for national legislation for the last thirty years. The party has not held the law-making of the government since 1858. When recalled newspapers undertake to make their readers believe that the democratic party is to be held accountable for the vicious legislation passed during that period, they should be at once rejected as unworthy of respect and confidence.

The subcommittee of the senate committee on privileges and elections, to which was referred the several propositions to amend the constitution so as to provide for electing United States senators by the direct vote of the people, has arrived at a conclusion respecting these measures. It is to favorably report to the full committee a substitute for the several propositions, reading as follows:

"That the senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, who shall be chosen by a direct vote of the people of the several states for six years, and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the legislature, and each senator shall have one vote. If a senator is elected by the electors of one state, and a senatorial district in another state, he shall be elected by the electors of the state in which he is elected."

The protection brethren passed the McKinley bill to keep out foreign imported goods, because they did not want the product of pauper labor in Europe to come in competition with the product of our own wage earners, and now, that the bill is in operation, they are boasting that we import more goods than before the passage of the bill. Such is the consistency of those who support a scheme, that, by the strong arm of the law, takes the hard earned coin out of one man's pocket and puts it into the pockets of another, the protected pet of the administration. Then, again these same protection brethren have been denouncing democrats as "free traders" and promoters of British interests because they propose to put binding twine, cotton ties, salt, lumber, etc., on the free list, and still they put sugar on the free list and boast of the great benefits derived therefrom as being the very best feature of the McKinley bill. In fact, about the only two things that these so benevolent supporters of protection's pet can boast of concerning the McKinley bill is free sugar and reciprocity, the first of which is free trade pure and simple, while the other is the strongest outcropping tendency to free trade. Simple minded and anthropocentric republicans all over the country are asking if this foretaste of free trade so graciously quashed by the republican leaders in the McKinley bill is so beneficial, what must the fruition of it be despised doctrine be.

A dispatch from St Louis says: William S Richardson, Grand Recorder, A O U W, received to-day a dispatch announcing that Charles C Anderson, of that place, who disappeared in 1879, had been found in a town in California. Anderson was City Marshal in Hannibal, and every effort made to locate him.

In April, 1890, Miss Annie T Anderson applied to the order for \$2,000, the amount of his death benefit, furnishing apparently satisfactory proofs of death, and the money was paid.

The officers are now contemplating action to recover the money.

A dispatch from Belfast says: Mrs Anna Montague, of Coleraine, daughter-in-law of Lord Montague, was tried today and found guilty of manslaughter for hanging her 3-year-old daughter up by the hands, the stocking with which the hands were tied getting around the child's neck and strangling her to death. The trial caused much excitement. Constables excluded the public, and guarded the courtroom. Trial on a charge of cruelty to children was at once begun.

This is from Chicago:

The local democratic committee, having in charge the arrangements for the national convention are indignant at what they term the rapacity of the east in trying to pack the convention for Hill or Gorman.

When the subject of a city was under debate Senator Bruce telegraphed Potter Palmer: "What will Chicago do?" Mr Palmer answered without consulting other democrats: "As well as in 1884."

Now, Secretary Sherman insists on holding Chicago to this promise, which means that this city will get only 1,500 of the 15,000 admission tickets issued. The local committee insists on half the tickets for footing the bills, or it will let the national committee foot the bills and do what it pleases.

There is almost an open rupture between the Chicago committee and the national sub-committee on the question.

A special from Washington to the Mail and Express says: "It is hinted here on the authority of western democrats that Grover Cleveland has a surprise in store for the anti-Hill men in New York. The visit of the ex-president to Michigan was full of conferences with leading democrats, and the general opinion of the men who talked to Cleveland was that he should refrain from appearing as a 'bolter.' Basing his action on this advice, it is now claimed that Cleveland will very soon inform his late secretary of the treasury that he does not wish him to proceed with the May convention. He will tell him that he does not care to go to Chicago as a 'bolter' or a 'kicker,' and precipitate an active anti-Hill fight at the beginning of the convention, and perhaps sustain defeat at the end. In place of such a performance he prefers to let the Hill convention stand and let the other states send Cleveland delegates to Chicago. Mr Cleveland has been advised that the effect of the solid Hill delegation from New York, such as already selected will not hurt his cause before that convention, half so much as a contest in which he appears as a bolter from the regular party. The convention will be thoroughly cognizant of the character of the Hill delegation, and with an overwhelming number of delegates from other states he can win without New York. Therefore, Cleveland will call off his May convention and go to work for delegates from the other states, but at the same keep up the anti-Hill work in New York to show that the opposition to the senator has neither languished nor died."
