

SERIOUS BUT HUMOROUS.—The Eugene Guard gets off the following funny, but true incidents: Saturday evening, shortly before dark, Levi Levere left Eugene for his home on the river road three miles below Eugene. After reaching the road at the Blair place, he took the path on the inside of the fence where the walking was better. Levere had gone but a short distance after leaving the railroad when a man with a mask over his face, and coat collar turned up, stepped out from the brush and presenting a shot gun told him to throw up his hands, as he wanted his money. Levere had \$25 on his person, but did not lose his presence of mind, and replied that he could not get any money from a "poor old tramp." He was then requested to yield his chewing tobacco, which he quickly did, then was told to go on. The same evening a Free Methodist minister was made to throw up his hands at the same place, and his money was demanded. He informed the law breaker that he was a minister and had none. The robber, from his actions, an amateur, did not doubt the word of the clerical gentleman and replied: "Go on. If you are a preacher you haven't got any money."

A SHATTERED YOUNG MAN.—Mr Frank Gaten, of Albion, passed through Albany today for the city hospital at Portland, for care and treatment. About three weeks ago he was hunting, when, in crossing over a log his gun was discharged, a shot going in one eye, another in a cheek, but most of the load passing into his right hand shattering it frightfully. Dr Rich of Yaquina, was sent for and started, but received word that young Gaten was dead, and returned home, and the young man has a Yaquina Bay paper in his possession with the announcement of his death. He was not dead, and after local attention Dr Rich was secured and amputated the arm above the wrist. The young man is standing the ordeal bravely and will probably come out all right, though he looks very pale and haggard now.

They immediately placed the matter in the hands of Chief of Police Hoffman, who telegraphed to Sacramento to the Chief of Police to intercept Kile on his arrival there at 10 o'clock this morning, which the Chief did, and immediately notified Mr Hoffman, who will leave tomorrow night for Sacramento with a warrant and requisition for Kile's arrest.

ANOTHER VERSION.—Yesterday we published an item in reference to the suit between W W Beck and J H Waters at Seattle saying it was partially in favor of Beck. Rev Kirkpatrick, who just came from Seattle, says it is in favor of the Mill company for about \$2300, and the following is from the Seattle Telegram, which as the Mill company are nearly all Brownsville people, will be of interest here: The case of W W Beck against the Ravenna milling company, continued from Wednesday, occupied nearly the entire day in Judge Humes' court yesterday, it being late in the afternoon when it went to the jury, who after a short retirement returned a verdict in favor of the mill company. The action was to recover money claimed against the mill company on the allegation that the capacity of the mill erected did not come up to stipulations on which subsidy was promised. The case has been dragging along for two years.

WAIVED EXAMINATION.—William Westfall, the green cloth knight who shot Philip Craig, appeared in Justice Bishop's court this forenoon and waived examination. 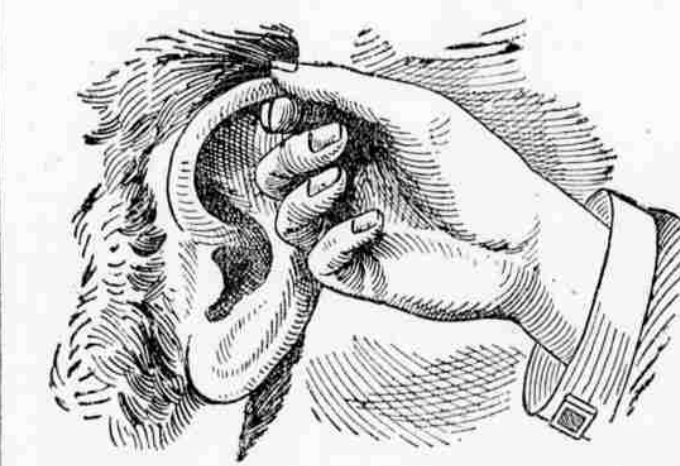

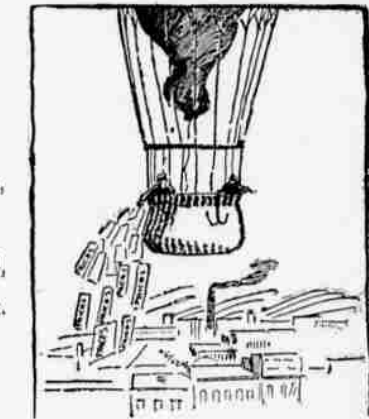
