The time to be offered up is near at hand—candidate.

The third party people will meet at Lebanon Saturday to nominate a county ticket.

The Democrats of Florence in Lane county have organized a club and called it the Cleveland Club. The great mass of democrats in Oregon are for Cleveland.

The democrat state convention of Rhode Island in convention yesterday instructed the eight delegates to the national convention to support Cleveland for the presidential nomination.

Blaine has made one of his characteristic mistakes in writing his letter about the Nevins-Blaine divorce. Circumstances tend strongly to show that this divorce trouble was the main reason why Blaine declined to be a candidate for president.

How pleasant, mild mannered and extremely solicitous as to one's health, is the candidate. If half our time was devoted to settling up primary elections and half the voters were candidates, what a happy sympathetic community we would be any way.

Democrats in Albany should remember that the polls will be open in these precincts from 1 o'clock to 7 o'clock in the afternoon Saturday. The names of the judges are given in another column. Let every democrat turn out and vote for such delegates as he would have to represent him in the county convention.

Democrats have a host of solid leaders either of whom would make splendid candidates. Besides Cleveland and Hill we have Carlisle, Palmer, Patterson, Boies, Flower, Gray, Russell, Vilas, Whitney, Campbell and others. And the republicans they have Harrison and in a sort of perfunctory way they take him to get rid of him.

The democrat party of Louisiana some time ago split into two portions on the lottery question, and each nominated a state ticket to be voted for at the state election. The lottery company has decided to withdraw its application for an extension of their charter and the leaders of the two democratic portions have decided to submit their two tickets to the primary meetings and the defeated one to withdraw. Primaries will be held March 22.

The McKinley bill gives woolen manufacturers 91 per cent. protection and the wool grower 41 per cent. The Times Mountaineer says this difference is in favor of the farmer and producer. Now in the name of common sense, tell us how this can be? Will the Mountaineer explain? It is a matter of regret that newspapers otherwise so sensible, should consent to support any cause that calls for so much juggling with reason and fact.

Democrats should bear in mind that the monopolies of the country will be, as they were in 1855, the close allies of the republicans in the coming national contest. For the favorable legislation they have received, and hope to receive, from that party, they could well afford to put 5 million dollars into the campaign. Manufacturers who make large profits off the consumers of their goods, will, as they have done before, put thousands, and millions if necessary, into the hands of such puppets as Wamamaker to carry the republican candidate through. Democrats have no money, hence their only appeal is to the manhood of American citizenship.

The alliance everywhere has made "equal privileges to all persons and special privileges to none" and unflinching opposition to all forms of class legislation a leading tenet of their faith. This is the strongest kind of democratic doctrine. How any one who is thoroughly indoctrinated in this faith can for a moment support the sub-treasury and loan scheme is hard to understand. A more pronounced kind of class legislation could hardly be conjured up. Any man inspired by the broad American doctrine of fair dealing who will fully investigate these schemes will not for a moment promulgate so selfish and at the same time, so dangerous a scheme of legislation.

The republican party of Idaho is making strenuous efforts to retain the Mormon vote. The republican league a few days ago refused to admit representatives from a Mormon club, whereat the party leaders were much alarmed and a meeting of the state committee was hurriedly called and the very accommodating press vouchsafes the following statement: "To-day the republican central committee adopted a resolution favorable to the Mormons. Saturday the republican league took a diametrically opposite course. Charles A. Shafer, secretary of the league, said to-night the understanding was that only Mormons who have abandoned polygamy were to be recognized by the republican party. The action of the league had not been clear, hence the action of the committee. What was 'favorable' was not mentioned in the dispatch. It is highly probable that it consisted in the passage of a resolution, after a very lengthy 'whereas,' declaring that during the pendency of an election Mormons were to be esteemed by the republican party of Idaho as 'loyal,' 'intelligent,' 'highly respectable,' and moral like people, just as all republicans are. But it was evidently accompanied by a mental reservation that must be read between the lines to the effect that as a matter of fact Mormons are an unsavory people fit only to associate with the dregs of society except on the days when republican votes are needed."

EDUCATION.

The term education is too often misunderstood and its value is too often undervalued, and not infrequently overdone; of the first we will undertake to say that the once prevalent idea that books contained the sum and substance of education is no longer recognized by prominent educators. Practical demonstration has become a leading feature of the well regulated schools in all the advanced and highly cultured parts of the world, including all the arts and sciences known to the age; practical thought is suggestive of demonstration, hence in many instances we find the student passing his text books and reaching far in advance of the established rules and regulations mapped out by educators of a few years ago, consequently we say that education must be practically obtained to be of value. And again, the requirements and acquirements, cannot be limited to systems and methods which curtail and hamper the active young mind of today as all comprehensive and accomplished educators will readily agree.

The value of education should never be measured by its costs in dollars and cents, but always by its mental and physical culture and attainments; nor should it rest here as an individual acquirement, but as a national influence and blessing, for herein lies the power and wealth, so to speak, of all the civilized nations of the world.

The matter of over-education, or in other words, wrong education, presents to us a subject requiring deep and serious meditation. We believe all persons of ordinary intelligence are susceptible of high attainments in some particular line of advancement, and just here is where the perceptiveness of parent and teacher is most needed, and becomes the more responsible; no greater mistake can be made in training the young mind than to crowd it with a line of thought that is not in harmony with its inherent nature, then in conclusion, we say, analyze the young mind and then develop the predominating capabilities. —Fortune Progress.
