## GOOD EVENING

THE DONATION ENTERTAINMENT.—A large audience was present last evening at the donation entertainment given by the Ladies' Aid Society for the benefit of the Orphan's Home and city hospital.

There was a liberal donation of articles, provisions, etc., from a potato masher to mattresses, bed spreads, etc., all of which will come into use at once. Mrs. Sloan has already taken charge of the home. The program was opened by a well rendered piano duet by Misses Ida Stuart and Margaret Hopkins. Mrs. Dr. Kelley read a short address showing what had been done towards building the home. About \$4000 has been raised and \$600 more expended than funds in the treasury. The four children in the Salem home will be brought here and placed in the Albany home. A vocal solo with guitar accompaniment was rendered by Mr. Chas. Hart in a manner to delight the audience and he was heartily encored. The Apollo club's vocal selection was also appreciated, resulting in an encore. A recitation by Arlene Train was well rendered and displayed a remarkable memory for one so young. Mrs. Langdon was heard in a vocal solo, her rich, perfect voice always giving renewed pleasure to an Albany audience. A hearty encore resulted. Mr. H. J. Hopkins and daughter rendered a horn alto and piano duet, when Hon. J. K. Weatherford delivered a ten minute address on the orphan's home movement. A song by the Apollo club, fifteen voices, closed the program, when a well gotten up lunch followed and an hour of sociability was engaged in.

LIKES THE NOTORIETY.—E. J. Huntley, the well-known clothing house drummer, who some weeks ago was robbed of his diamonds and gold watch, has recovered his valuable property and again is happy as a lord. Everyone knows "Diamond Ed," as he is known, and when it was learned that he had been held up by highwaymen and robbed of his jewels, he met with general sympathy from a host of friends. Recently while in Portland, he was approached by a gentleman, who soon made his business known and the result was that Huntley gave up \$2000 in solid coin and in return received his highly prized diamonds and watch. Once more he is able to strut about the streets with \$18,000 in diamonds displayed upon his shirt bosom while the "go between," safe from arrest and prosecution, has stowed away the \$2000 bill for the recovery of the same.—Ex. 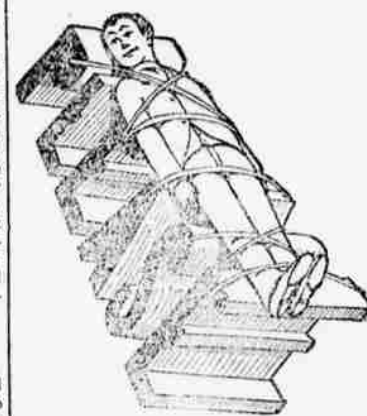
