

THE CONVENTION TO-MORROW.

No more important duty ever devolved upon a democratic convention in Linn county than upon that which convenes in this city to-morrow. The first duty is to the entire people of the county of all political faiths...

VIVE VOICE VOTING.

To the delegates to the county convention to-morrow, we desire to submit these facts. Four years ago the democrats throughout the county very generally expressed themselves in favor of the vive voce method of voting in the convention.

The democrats elected county clerk by 43 majority, recorder by 24 majority, sheriff by 100 majority, treasurer by 192 majority, one county commissioner by 23 majority and the other by 14, assessor by 131 majority, school supt. 123 majority, surveyor 61 and coroner 195 majority. The republicans elected the county judge. Two years ago the democrats were likewise in favor of an open convention and the convention respected their wish by adopting the vive voce method of voting.

The house committee on election of president and vice president has authorized Representative Craig to prepare for submission to the house a joint resolution proposing the substitution of the 31st day of December for the fourth of March as the commencement and termination of official terms of members of the house of representatives and United States senators, and providing that congress shall hold its annual meeting the second Monday in January, and substituting the 30th of April for the 4th of March as the date for the commencement and limitation of the term of president and vice president.

The census returns for New York City are all in, with the exception of two election districts. The total population of twenty-four assembly districts, according to the enumeration, is 1,795,295. This is about 500,000 more than that shown by the defective Porter census. The total population of Brooklyn, according to the census returns so far handed in, with the exception of one district, is 953,338. The missing district will probably bring it up to 955,000. The federal census for 1890 was 806,342, and the police census, four months later, 823,945.

At a meeting and banquet of the democrat club in New York City a few evenings since Mr. Forghar a Tammany member of the legislature drew forth much applause when he said that although Tammany Hall might be in favor of Senator Hill's nomination for President, still the old organization would give a hearty and loyal support to Grover Cleveland should he secure the prize.

A dispatch from Covington, Georgia, says: President L. F. Livingston, of the State Alliance of Georgia, addressed a mass-meeting of five thousand alliance men here today. The following resolution was unanimously passed: "That we, the democratic and alliance citizens of Newton county, most heartily endorse Col. Livingston's position opposed to the formation of a third party at this time."

In his speech Col. Livingston declared that before his election Speaker Crisp was pledged to liberal financial legislation. Chairman W. C. Jones, of the Kansas democratic committee; Ex-Gov. Glick and other Kansas leaders have held a secret conference and, it is understood, decided to hold the delegate convention early and have the delegates to Chicago instructed to vote as a unit for Cleveland as an offset to the Hill convention in New York.

A dispatch from New York under date of March 5th says: The old contest between the first mortgage bondholders of the Oregon Pacific, and its former president, T. Egenton Hugg, now receiver of the company, has been renewed. The bondholders met today and received a report from the reorganization committee. After a prolonged discussion it was resolved the committee should prepare a new plan providing for the preparation of property for the benefit of the assenting bondholders, and should have full power to take all action necessary for their protection. The Farmers' Loan and Trust Company, trustee of the mortgage, is also instructed to take proceedings in the Oregon courts to set aside all the recent sale. The reorganization committee consists of Lindley Snyth, of Philadelphia; Alexander Brown, of Baltimore; Roland Hazzard, of Peacedale, R. I.; and James A. Blair and George S. Cook, of this city.

Senator Carlisle whose fidelity to the principles of the democratic party is without question and whose insight into things political is surpassed by no democrat in the country, says: "In my opinion the continued agitation of the silver question in this congress is not only useless, but very unwise. Everybody appears to admit that no free-coinage bill can become a law, because if passed by both houses it would be vetoed by the president and there the matter would end. Practically, therefore, there is nothing whatever to be accomplished by the agitation, except to engender divisions and dissensions among those who are substantially united upon all other economic and political questions. Our true policy, it seems to me, is to secure as far as possible economy in public expenditures, make a clear and emphatic record in favor of the reduction of taxation upon all the necessities of life, urge the repeal of all subsidies and bounties to favored interests and adjourn as early as possible day."

"Upon all the questions which really divide the democratic and republican parties a large majority of the people will support us, and if we can confine the approaching contest to those questions alone the victory is already won."

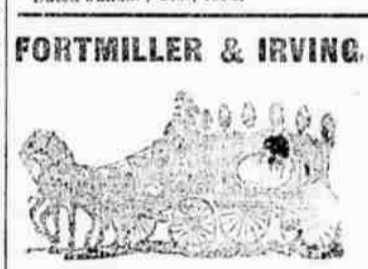
