GOOD EVENING

FOR HORSE STEALING.—The circuit court of Lane county this week tried Chas Baker and F S Phelps on the charge of stealing a span of horses, at Coburg, and acquitted them, the evidence being incomplete. Last October they were arrested by Sheriff Croisan of Marion county, in Yamhill county, with a large amount of property in their possession, among other things several horses, etc., belonging to Linn county men, which had been taken on a trip made from Coburg north. The complaint is sworn to by S M Needham and charges the men with unlawfully and feloniously taking and stealing one three year old sorrel mare, value \$80, one light gray mare of the value of \$150; one open two horse hack and set of harness of the value of \$30, one pair of gray blankets, one oil cloth cushion, one pair of buggy lines of the value of \$12, the personal property of S M Needham, T J Anderson, Vin Royce and M V Baltimore, of the total value of \$270.

An adjournment was rendered until 1 o'clock tomorrow to permit the men's attorney, Judge McEldred, of Corvallis, to be present. Mr Baker is an old resident of the valley, and his brother is here now in his interest.

MONTHLY SHOOT.—Yesterday the Mascot Gun Club held their monthly shoot for medals, and an interesting time was had, though the score for the medals was poor. Twenty tin pigeons were shot at, as follows: Wm Jones, 15, giving him the gold medal; W E Baker, 12, giving him the silver medal; Wm Hopkins, 11; D B Monteith, 11; Wirt Libby, 10; Grant Froman, 9; Bogardus, 6; L W Deyoe, 6. Mr Deyoe, who has held the gold medal twice getting the leather medal. A practice shoot at twenty pigeons, resulted as follows: Bogardus, 18; Monteith, 17; Jones, 16; Froman, 15; Hopkins, 14; Deyoe, 13; Barker, 12. On Tuesday a shoot was had in which Dr E O Smith, one of Tacoma's crack shots, engaged, with the following result: 54 birds being shot at: L W Deyoe, 43; Dr Smith, 33; D B Monteith, 29; Bogardus 31. Mr Deyoe, though now wearing the leather medal easily carrying off the honors.

CAUSES JOY.—The Astoria Talk has intelligence of absolute authenticity that Captain George Flavel has sold his famous Tany Point farm. The purchaser are E L Dwyer, P J Burke, and other railroad functionaries. The price paid is \$300,000. The sale is fully consummated, and it is one to be hailed with unbounded gratification by the residents of the lower Columbia. Its import is unmistakable, as the anxiety of a most auspicious day of prosperity now about to dawn, after the long and gloomy night that has tediously hovered over the peninsula and the country round about. Astorians may well be enthusiastic, as they are, over the announcement. The good news is almost of electrical force, and full of the gladdest of inspiration.

GROWING.—The Oregon Oracle is growing at the Southern Pacific, particularly at Mr Koehler. Here is one of them, interesting in itself, and also because it shows that Albany's position as the heart of the valley is appreciated. His East Side road runs from a city of 80,000 people through a valley of 160,000 people, and yet you cannot get from that city to the valley between 8:30 a m and 5 p m each day. Neither can you get from the head of that valley (Eugene) after 10 o'clock a m; the heart of the valley (Albany) after 12:30 o'clock p m; the capital of the state (Salem) after 1:40 p m; to the metropolis of the state (Portland) the same day. That is railroading with a burrah.

ALBANY GROWING.—The fiscal postal year closes on March 31st. It will be a gratifying fact to learn that the postal receipts of the Albany post office have increased so rapidly the past year as to raise Albany from a third to a second class office, the receipts for the year already being sufficient to justify this. The business of a post office always speaks for the growth of a city. Besides this indication the directory census now being taken will show from present indications, that the city has grown at least 500 since the census of 1890.

In company with Dr D M Jones, of Albany, we visited the new C P church edifice in Albany, Monday. The building is nearing completion and when finished will be one of the handsomest structures of the kind in the county seat. W J Bennett, the architect, has shown marked taste and skill in designing this structure.—Advocate.

AN INSANE MAN.—Mr Alexander Ross was examined this forenoon by a commission consisting of Drs Maston and Irvine, and committed to the insane asylum, to which place he was taken by J N Hoffman this noon. Ross is an old druggist, and has been traveling for a Portland house. Years ago he was in business for himself and was burned out, receiving injuries which have since affected him some. He was seen wandering around Tangent jumping fences in a strange manner. He seemed to think some one was after him, but his mind run mostly on an elevated railroad he was to build between Silverton, his home, and a ranch owned by him at Silver Creek Falls. He is a business looking man. The case is an unfortunate one.

THE REASON OF IT.—It was left for the Newport Times to discover the real reason of E P Rogers' recent trip over the Oregon Pacific. Here it is: Mr E P Rogers, general freight and passenger agent for the Southern Pacific, arrived in Yaguina City Monday. It seems the Oregon City paper mills have discovered an almost inexhaustible supply of good pulp material on the line of the O P in the mountains and will use it if the roads can make them a low enough rate of transportation to their mills. Mr Rogers took a spin to the O P front to secure the proper lay of the land. The result of this visit we have not ascertained.

VERY PROGRESSIVE.—There are some pretty small men in some city councils. Ashland evidently has a few. The Grants Pass Courier says, Ashland is getting very progressive. The council has just passed ordinances prohibiting boys from selling apples at the trains and forbidding hotel runners from encroaching on the sacred precincts of the depot in search of patrons. It looks as though the railroad had considerable to say in running that town. The few apples sold by the children in the course of the season could not work an injury to anyone, and the tired passengers should certainly be allowed to purchase Oregon's fresh green fruit.

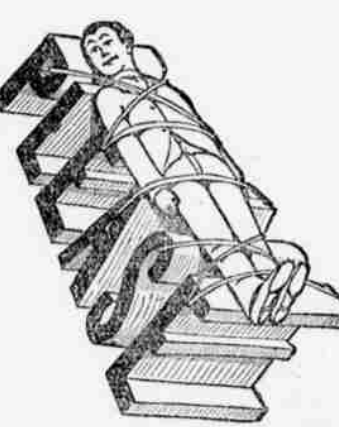

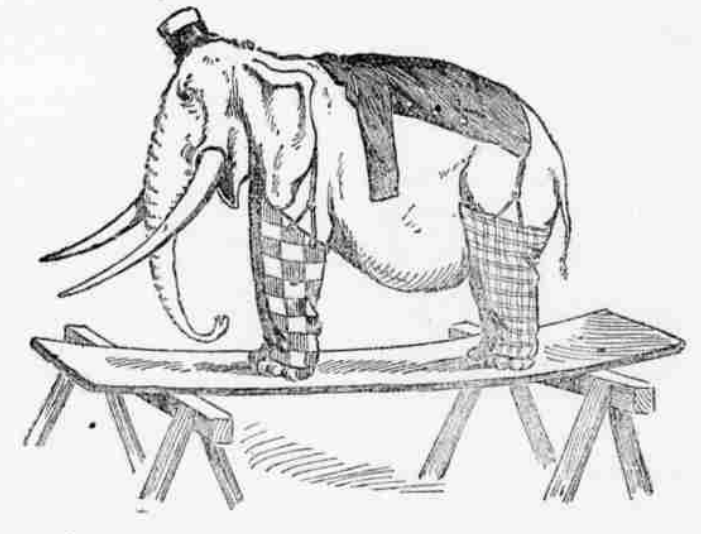
