YES, IT DOES.

The world owes more to the day laborer than it does to the parasite who acquires wealth by taking advantage of his fellows.

Why, then, do you defend the things which give to parasites what in equity belong to others? You advocate things which give to the strong at the expense of the weak. You profess to believe that men can receive "benefits" without robbing others. You think that extreme selfishness is practical, and that self preservation means the sacrifice of the many for the benefit of the few. You revere old institutions, regardless of merit, and depend upon custom and precedent with a devotion which is only natural to the partisan and the fellow who is "stuck" on himself and the things which are his. You belong to the republican party, which is the reason that you cannot come out boldly at all times for the right. We don't blame you, for really, we are aware, you do what you deem to be best for your own self interest, under the circumstances. Bread and butter depend upon it, and these seldom fail to convince the most self-willed and determined.

If any proof were needed to show the intense zeal and earnestness of the democrats of Linn county to do their whole duty in the coming campaign in this county it is supplied in the fact that there were 101 delegates elected to the late convention and 100 were present. Except in two or three precincts the primaries were very fully attended. From information that comes to us from various parts of the county we learn that the feeling at the outcome of the convention is one of very general satisfaction. All around the true blue democrats are arm-ing for the fray and a more gallant, courageous fight will be made than ever before. Leaders in all parts of the county have made up their minds this year to have one of their old time victories, and they are not to be disappointed.

Republican papers in Oregon are attempting to make much out of the fact that democrats are not united in their views on the silver question. But we would ask what will the republican papers and leaders in Oregon who favor free silver do when they come to support Harrison on an anti-free silver platform? What will John H. Mitchell, Hermann, the Salem Journal, the Herald, the Oregonian and most all the republican papers of the state do in that case? The Democrat is not aware that the silver question is a purely partisan one, but if so we ask again what will they do in such a case.

It has been practically decided by the leading democrats of Kansas not to put a presidential electoral ticket in the field, and to support the people's party electoral ticket. A fusion will also be effected on state officers and congressmen at large. The democrats and alliance leaders claim that this will wipe out the republican party in Kansas. The same tactics are to be used in Nebraska and the Dakotas. To offset this the republican leaders of these states urge that the republicans in Virginia, Tennessee, Georgia, and the Carolinas enter into a fusion with the new party.

Interstate Commissioner William R. Morrison, of Illinois, speaking of the democratic convention in Cook county, embracing the city of Chicago, which last week endorsed Palmer for president, he declared he could not see that it was conducted any differently from the Hill convention in New York. He was opposed to Palmer's candidacy and regarded it an unwise movement. Said Mr. Morrison: "He is altogether too old to become a candidate. We shall have many friends in the state convention and they will be opposed to Palmer's candidacy. I want to say right here, however, that I never bolted a nominee in my life, and never will."

The following ticket has been placed in nomination by the people's party in Umatilla county: Representatives, Robert Laing C. H. Roberts, and J. T. Henkle; county judge, A. B. Stanley; county commissioner, J. H. King; sheriff, Louis Keith; clerk, A. A. Walker; treasurer, William Sullivan; school superintendent, Miss Hattie Woodruff; surveyor, A. L. Adams; coroner, Sol Wornley.

Judge Blackburn of this city is quite favorably spoken of by republican papers throughout the state as a candidate for supreme judge. The judge is a man of integrity, ability, and rare amiability and would adorn the bench.

To the Seattle Telegraph: We desire to extend, in this public manner, our hearty congratulations for the magnificent services performed in leading on to a gallant victory for the Seattle democrats.

A daily Baltimore paper publishes the personal presidential preferences of ninety-six editors of Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia. The total for Cleveland in the three states is 33, against 23 for all other candidates. The republican preferences are mainly for Harrison.

Senator Stewart, of Nevada, will offer a joint resolution proposing a 16th amendment, that no person shall hold the office of president of the United States two successive terms.

Republicans of Indiana in state convention instructed for Harrison.

Acting Secretary Spaulding has sent to the house, in answer to a resolution of that body, a letter containing information on the subject of the issue and redemption of gold and silver certificates, etc. The letter shows the gold certificates issued from July, 1877, to January 1, 1892, amounted to \$569,039,805, and the amount redeemed to \$445,988,563. The issue of silver certificates from May 9, 1878, to January, 1892, aggregated \$68,708,000, and the amount redeemed, \$356,311,682. The paper money outstanding July 1, 1886, was \$21,431,194, and the amount January 1, 1892, \$1,097,281,512. Generally speaking, the acting secretary says the gold certificates were redeemed principally in gold coin or bullion, while the silver certificates, being usually presented in a mutilated condition, were redeemed by issue of new silver certificates.

A dispatch from Wheeling, West Virginia, says:

Over one hundred interviews with leading democrats of eastern Ohio on the presidential question will be printed here tomorrow. More than three-fourths of the expressions are enthusiastically for Cleveland, with ex-Gov. Campbell as second choice. Only five are for Hill. Gorman and Palmer get a few votes. A large proportion say they would not support Hill if nominated on account of his difference and refusal to help Campbell last year.

The democrats of Medford, Jackson county, organized a club on the 11th of January, with Judge John D. Whitman as president; Judge G. L. Walton and F. M. Plymale, vice presidents, William Slinger, treasurer, S. S. Pentz, secretary, and D. T. Seras, recording secretary. Executive committee, George L. Walton, F. M. Plymale and B. Pickel. The club numbers 50 members and is working very harmoniously.

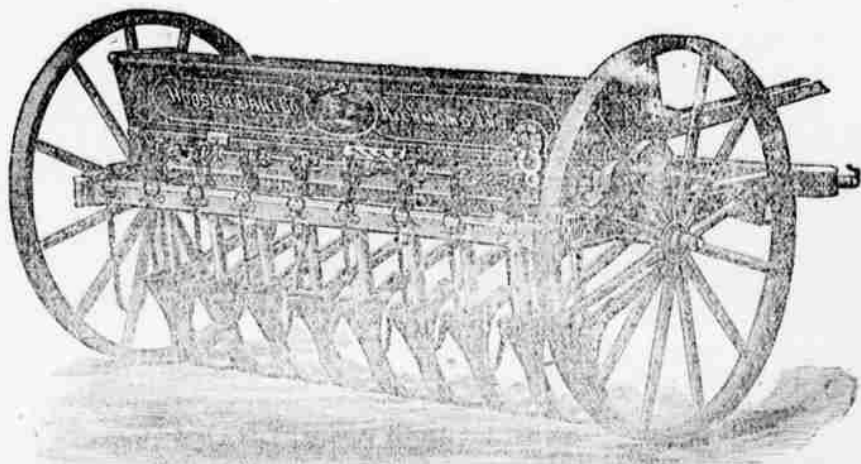
