

AFTER CHINAMEN.—The Ochoco Review has the following sensational item: Last Saturday morning Ah Doon, proprietor of the Pilsen Hotel, took passage on the stage for The Dalles, and when the stage was about four miles from town and was going up a short hill north of McKay creek, six masked men rose up in the road, ordered the driver, John Miller, to halt and with drawn pistols made Doon get off the stage. A large man, who did all the talking, struck him, he thinks with a pistol, making a severe cut on his mouth. Then they bound his hands behind his back and hit him several times, and threatened to hang him unless he would promise to leave the country and take all the Chinamen here with him. One of the party cut off his cue, and after again trying to make him promise to take all the Chinamen out of the country, put him on the stage and ordered the driver to go on. They made no attempt to rob him or take any money or papers from him. The same night Ah Tye, manager of Quong Hing & Co's store, says either six or seven men came to his store and tried to get him out, but he refused to open his doors and they went away. He thinks they wanted to get him out and kill him or cut off his cue.

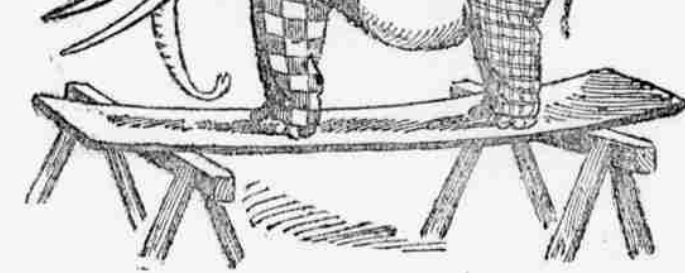
