

DAVER'S LECTURE.—Rev. Dyer delivered his lecture last night, at the M. E. church, on "What Made the Yankee," to a very appreciative audience. It was full of cream, displaying research and originality of thought. Few men possess a greater store of general information. The speaker showed how our constitution was modeled after that of the Israelites, mentioning several striking likenesses. There were thirteen tribes of the Israelites and thirteen states of the U. S. No foreigner could rule over either. A foreigner could be naturalized, etc. He made the Yankee, (any native citizen of the U. S.), the greatest of all men, first in war, first in government and first in inventive genius. He is made up of all nationalities going before him, hence his wonderful versatility and leadership in the present progress of the world. He is the consummation of all other people. He said it took 2000 years to make the Jew, 4000 to make the Dutchman and 6000 to make the Yankee.

Tonight Rev. Dyer will lecture on "The National Position, Powers and Influence of Woman." There should be a good attendance, for the lectures are of a character deserving a large support.

One of the horses was a blood bay filly and the other a light bay horse. One was three years old and the other four. It is supposed that two young men were the guilty parties. Deputy sheriffs are out searching for the men, \$50 reward is offered.—Guard.

A GUN ACCIDENT.—While going out to meet the steamer Elwood in a small boat near Independence John Murphy, of Monmouth, was accidentally shot in the left arm Sunday morning. He and a companion were in the boat and there was also a shotgun lying in the bottom of the boat. As they neared the steamer the skiff began to rock, and, while Murphy was placing the gun in a better position, the hammer caught on the seat and discharged the gun. Murphy was taken to Independence where the arm was dressed, though it is not likely it can be saved.—Statesman.

The Seattle Telegram says: The Salem, Or., Journal recently commented on the condition of the Sound country in an unfriendly spirit. It represents Seattle, Tacoma and other cities and towns to be suffering from "busted booms," as being in a very bad condition, and makes the wildly absurd statement that "it will take twenty years for the country to grow up to the level of the cities as they now stand." The writer says that this wretched state of affairs results from the failure to tax mortgages, and points to the Oregon burgs as evidence of the good result of the opposite policy. Surely, no more unconvincing argument could be offered. Any one who should look at Salem and Seattle, and be persuaded that mortgage taxation worked the difference, would never want to tax another mortgage. The Sound country is all right. It is progressing steadily.

Here is something about Kansas, that wonderful state the Salem man wrote about: "There are twenty well-built towns in this state without a single inhabitant to walk the echoes of their deserted streets. Saratoga has a \$30,000 opera house, a large brick hotel, a \$20,000 school house and a number of fine business houses, yet there is nobody even to claim a place to sleep. Her banks remain, but they are silent. Some of her dwellings stand there, monuments of the credulity of man. At Fargo a \$25,000 school house stands on the side of the hill, a monument of the bond-voting craze. Most of the buildings have been removed or are torn down. The hotel keeps gloomy watch over the remaining houses aided by the 'bank.' A herder and his family constitute the sole population of what was once an incorporated city."

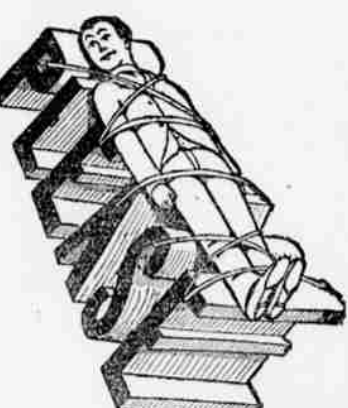

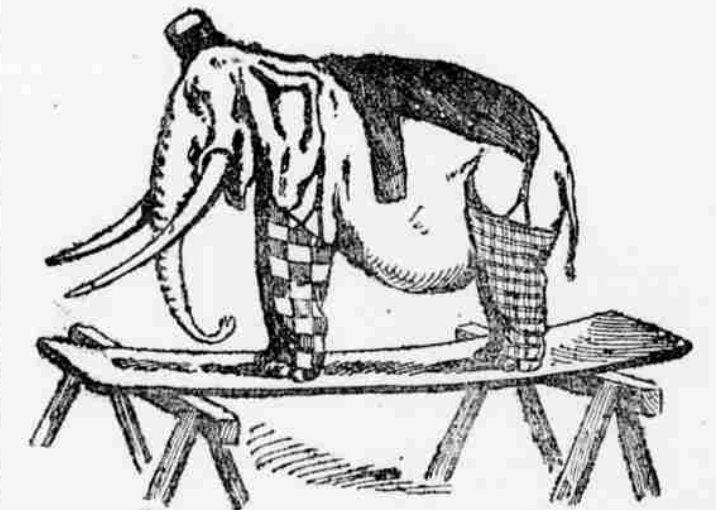
