

THE TIN-PLATE FAKE.

It is a favorite statement with the protection organs that tin plate is now sold as low or lower than it was previous to the passage of the McKinley bill. Even some republican newspapers, which are not given to reckless statements, but which have a regard for their reputation for veracity, are publishing this tin plate campaign falsehood with the utmost freedom and in the apparent belief that it is true. Hence it becomes necessary not only to give a flat and positive contradiction to this statement, but to give the figures in support of the contradiction.

In order to ascertain the exact truth the *Telegram* has interviewed our local jobbers, all of whom are familiar with the price of tinware and some of whom are importers of tin plate goods. As a result of our investigation we submit the following figures, showing prices named by importers on articles placed during the spring and summer of 1892, previous to the passage of the McKinley bill, and on orders placed during February, 1892:

14x20 BV plate for canners' use—	1892.
\$4.90 per box, \$6.25 per box,	or an advance of \$1.35 per box.
14x20 IC Melyn bright plate—	1892.
\$6.05 per box, \$7.20 per box,	or an advance of \$1.15 per box.
20x28 Dean roofing plate—	1892.
\$9.70 per box, \$11.85 per box,	or an advance of \$2.15 per box.

If any one doubts the accuracy of these figures, we ask him to call upon the local importing houses for verification. These figures tell the whole tale. Hence there can be no justification for the reckless statements made by the protection organs that the price of tin plate has not been increased by operation of the McKinley bill. A certain stretch of imagination is allowable in a political campaign, and a perversion of facts and figures for campaign purposes is to be expected. But there can be no excuse for such willful and reckless disregard of the truth as the protection organs manifest in this particular, except upon the principle that a lie well stuck to answers the purposes of the truth. Yet, in this age of intelligence and universal information, the voters cannot be deceived when they have access to correct sources of information.—*Evening Telegram*.

IT RESTS WITH THE PEOPLE.

The republican press is an object lesson worthy of study just now. It is unanimous against Cleveland and equally so in favor of Hill as democratic candidate for president. It dreads the great leader and the record he left. It is terrified at the prospect of meeting its own issue of tariff reform. Knowing that President Cleveland entreated congress to reduce taxation, as it was producing \$500,000,000 yearly more than the government needed or could honestly use, while President Harrison has not only used up the whole surplus, but enormously increased taxation, they appreciate that it will be a tough job to face the people on such a record, and hence they are in substance asking democrats not to nominate the man of iron firmness, but something plastic that can be corked up to defeat both economy and reform. They want discord and division, and hall every symptom of it with heartfelt applause. It is their sole hope. A united democracy cannot be defeated.

It is well known that secret agents of Hill have been sent out all over the west and south to set up the machine, work all possible discord, and thus betray the party in its hour of night. The first step will be to "sneak" the caucuses where possible, throw the people off their guard, and have the business done up without their taking part. The way to meet this danger to everything democratic is for the people to take their caucus work into their own hands and see to it that every democratic voter is posted and has a chance to make known his wishes. Fraud and deceit should be trampled out wherever they appear. Everything should be open, fair and above-board. No caucus tricks should be tolerated. The New York machine should be taught that their system of operations can get no countenance in the west.—*Milwaukee Journal*.

Governor McKinley is the author of several epigrams on the wool tariff. The latest was made in his speech at Detroit: "You can't make wool free on a sheep's back while you tax it on our backs." This is an effective way to put the principle that producers must share the benefits of protection with manufacturers, or they will refuse to pay its cost. The producer is a consumer of woolen cloth, as the maker of the cloth is a consumer of raw wool. Each pays a certain part of the duty imposed to protect the other. If one shirks, the other will. Free wool will bring free woolen cloth.

A dispatch from St Paul Minnesota says: The split of the alliance men in the Otter Tail county convention yesterday afternoon develops a political scheme of vast proportions. Otter Tail county is the center of the alliance strength in Minnesota, and it was sought yesterday to give the new people's party a good send off from that point. President Donnelly of the alliance had appointed a committee to manipulate things up there, but they were refused recognition by the anti-Donnelly element, which handled matters in the interest of the old alliance party.

It is learned that this method of procedure is to prevail in all the northern and western counties. The people's party is to be repudiated in every possible instance and delegates chosen to an alliance state convention. The plan is to hold a straight alliance convention, repudiate the people's party, sub-treasury schemes, say nothing on free silver, nominate Sidney M. Owen for governor, ask the democrats for life endorsement, and offer to divide the presidential electors, giving the democrats five out of nine.

The anti-Donnelly men, who number about three-fifths of the alliance, employ this method to clip the wings of Mr. Donnelly, who has presidential aspirations. Democrats who were seen this evening said they had been apprised of the coming revolt some days ago. Secretary Smalley of the democratic state central committee said: "Of course any talk of a fusion with the sub-treasury wing of the alliance is nonsense, but no harm could come from uniting with a wing of the party which is willing to stand practically on a democratic platform."

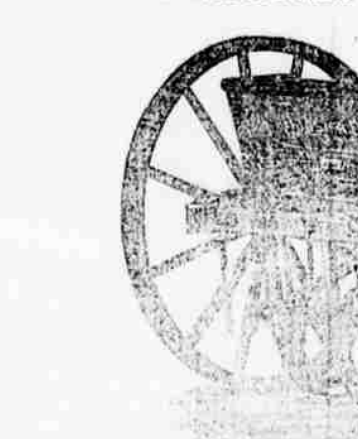
