

Practically None of it for Sale to Consumers.

The Tin Plate Consumers' Association a short time ago issued its "Circular No. 3," which it mailed to consumers of tin plate all over the country. The circular was as follows:

"In furtherance of the objects of the Tin Plate Consumers' Association, the directors respectfully request the members of the association to furnish monthly returns of all the American made tin plates purchased by them, beginning with the month of January, 1892; also stating whether any American made tin plates have been bought by them previous to the 1st of same month, and, if so, what quantities, sizes, and kind. The names of those forwarding the information will be regarded as confidential by the directors and will not be published."

One hundred and fifteen replies to this circular have already been received by Mr. Robert Ganz, secretary of the association, and the National Provisioner, published a statement, prepared by Mr. Ganz, showing what these replies contained. From this statement, it appears, that of the 115 heard from, exactly 100 announce in various ways that they have not bought any American made tin plate. Samples of the replies are as follows:

San Francisco—"We have not been able to obtain any American made tin or terne plates so far."

New Haven—"We use only highest grade tin plates, and we have not heard of any of these being manufactured."

Chicago—"Have not been able to find any."

Chicago—"None of any kind except a sample box of 20x28 terne."

Dundee, Ill—"The tin plate which we use is not yet made in the United States."

Highland, Ill—"Obtained none up to date."

Indianapolis—"We have obtained no American tin plates whatever."

Vincennes, Ind—"We have not had any American-made tin plate yet."

Louisville—"I cannot buy any that I know of."

New Orleans—"As yet have not been offered any."

Baltimore—"Have not been able to obtain any. Have neither bought nor been offered any American tin plate."

Ridgely, Md—"We have never seen a piece of American-made tin plate, and never had any offers or quotations."

Boston—"We have not bought nor have we been offered a single sheet of American tin plate."

Boston—"Have not heard of any American tin plates in this market."

Adrian, Mich—"We have not been able to get any tin plates suitable for our use except imported article. If you know of any manufacturers of the article we would like to have their address."

Kansas City, Mo—"On December 3 last we ordered a carload of tin plates for January delivery from American manufacturers. There is no immediate prospect of getting same, and we will cancel order for same."

Omaha—"None offered, and we do not believe there is any in the market."

Brooklyn—"Have neither bought nor had any offered to me. Have not been able to find any suitable for my purposes on making inquiry."

Buffalo—"Have not bought any tin plate manufactured in this country; none offered at any price."

New York City—"Have not seen any except in Tribune newspaper."

Waverly, N Y—"None offered."

Woodstock, N Y—"Have not bought any American tin plate. Do not know where it is made."

Cincinnati—"We have not bought or seen any American tin or terne plates for commercial use; only political."

Philadelphia—"We have not been able to buy a single sheet of American tin plate."

Pittsburg—"Cannot get any, but would like to."

Milwaukee—"We have not had any American tin plate offered to us, consequently we have not made any purchases."

Fifteen of those who replied to the circular wrote that they had purchased American-made tin plates. Some of the answers were as follows:

Sioux City, Iowa—"Five boxes."

St Louis—"Sixty boxes bought and delivered in May, 1891."

Cleveland—"One box, but price too high for us."

Toledo—"Ten boxes. Prices about equal to imported plates of same quality; no better."

Philadelphia—"Five boxes. We have had no plates offered us by any manufacturer. The above were bought to try the quality."

The total number of boxes reported by the fifteen purchasers is 665. A part of these are on hand in jobber's stores.

DEFIES THE THIRD PARTY

Chief Justice Peter Turney of Tennessee, in announcing, in answer to popular demand, his candidacy for the democratic nomination for governor in that state, issues this defiance to the "third party": "When we find democrats in danger of falling unwarily into the snares and traps of designing men, who are organizing, secret and oath-bound societies for selfish purposes, and laboring to foist their heresies upon the democratic party, let every true democrat feel it to be his duty to reason with him sought to be entrapped and point out the undemocratic teachings of the false leaders. Democracy has no secrets. Oaths are not necessary to its existence. It is bold, open and candid; not afraid of light and publicity. Its principles are embodied in the constitution and bill of rights. It demands that every member of its family shall publicly subscribe to its faith, and not be ashamed to confess it. It can and will make no concessions to unconstitutional tenets. It is the party of the people—the people's friend."—Ex.

A Salem paper, encouraging the alliance ticket in Linn county, says that the third party movement makes the political situation doubtful, with the chances in favor of the republicans. This it says, "is a flattering state of affairs, which, though a little hard on the machine democrats at the county seat, will tend to improve county government not a little." Inasmuch as Linn county has for years been out of debt and its tax levy is about the lowest in the state, it is not clear why it would be beneficial to turn the county government over to republicans. It is generally a safe rule to let well enough alone. Perhaps it would be better advice to suggest to the voters of Marion county that its "machine" republicans be turned out. Linn county has been governed better than Marion.
