A dispatch from New Orleans says: One hundred and fifty of the business men of the city were interrogated yesterday as to their choice for president. The result was: Cleveland, 99; Hill, 88; Boies, 6; Palmer, 4; Campbell, 2; Gorman, 12. Hill's speech at Jackson has been a disappointment to many people here and has not gained him any new friends.

Senator Hill, in his southern speeches, stated the democratic position upon the tariff in this way: "We do not want taxation imposed except for public purposes." In other words, a tariff for revenue only. And in this way: "We want no government partnership with private enterprises." Which is equivalent to saying no tariff-protected monopolies. There appears to be no protection flies on Senator Hill.

The confirmation by the senate of the appointment of Judge Woods is likely to furnish the democrats with a political weapon that will not doubt be used without stint should president Harrison get a renomination. The public will not be allowed to forget his rather unsavory connection with the notorious "blocks of five" political scheme, and the fact that President Harrison has rewarded him for his underhanded out effective political aid does not redound to the credit of the nominal head of a great party.—Talk, Astoria.

The farmer's alliance leaders in Minnesota appear to be preparing to follow the example of their brethren in Kansas and unite with the democrats in the approaching election. The basis talked of for a fusion is to have the democrats support an alliance man for governor, and divide the presidential electors, giving five of the pine to the democrats. At the last election in 1890 the democrats polled 85,844, the republicans 88,111 and the alliance 58,644. The union, therefore, if carried out, would give an anti-republican majority of over 50,000.

The first issue of the *Marion County Democrat*, a weekly democratic paper, published at Salem, is at hand. The editor and proprietor is E. H. Flagg, well known in Oregon journalism. It is an eight page, six column sheet, printed on new material well gotten up, and ably edited. The democrats of Marion county have long needed a paper that would present their side of the political issues of the day. Every democrat in the county as a matter of party duty should become a subscriber at once. To any family, outside of all party considerations, the paper is worth double its subscription price.

A few days since Harrison got mad at Hayti, Venezuela and the United States of Columbia. And does the reader ask why? Well it was this: Harrison wanted these governments to open up their ports to free trade in a long line of American products. That is he wanted these governments to let our products go into those countries free. But they would not do it. They said to the Harrison administration: "You, who have, with blind zeal, adopted protection as a policy, present a very cheeky spectacle in demanding that we shall adopt free trade." And they refuse. Then Harrison proceeds to retaliate by imposing a duty on the coffee, tea, sugar, molasses and other goods shipped from those countries into ours. Now, please tell us who will suffer from this? Will it not be our own citizens who will still buy and use these articles? Such are the beauties of republican reciprocity.

One of the singular results of the Russian famine, and one which is puzzling the economist for an explanation, is the enormous increase in the number of marriages in the afflicted districts. The theory most commonly advanced to account for this matrimonial "boom" is that that the fees charged by the priests for performing marriages have been greatly lessened. The priests find it more difficult to get a living than in bountiful seasons, and have accordingly reduced their rates so as to bring marriage, so to speak, within the means of the humblest citizen. Formerly the regular charge was five roubles. It is now fifty copecks; and the various attendant expenses have also been curtailed. Persons who have been contemplating marriage at some time in the near future are therefore induced to scrape a few copecks together and have the ceremony performed now, taking advantage of famine prices.

Ex Governor Buckner, of Kentucky, who has just returned from Washington, says:

Cleveland ought to be nominated regardless of the fight against him in New York. The democracy ought to say to the New York politicians: "We will nominate Cleveland and elect him in spite of you."

The fact that Cleveland's has been the only democratic administration since the war and that it kept every promise the party has made to the people, and that his emphatic enunciation of the democratic principles of tariff reform set the people thinking and resulted in the great popular victory two years ago, would make it impish our record to look elsewhere for a candidate.

"As for Hill, if he has any democratic opinions I don't know of them, and know nobody who does. If he has any policy beyond his own advancement I have been unable to discover it."

The few disappointments that followed the nominations made at the late democratic county conventions are fast fading out. The party throughout the country is fast placing itself in line for the battle of the ballots which is to come off in June. As a whole the democrats have an excellent ticket, and under the active preparations being made by the county committee, the democrats in most of the precincts are organizing to add another to the long line of democratic victories achieved in Linn county. The committee's appeal is to every democrat to put his shoulder to the wheel and push on to victory.

There is a call for a mass meeting of the people's party of Marion county to be held at Salem Friday, April 1st, 1892, at 10 o'clock a.m. to nominate a full county ticket.
