GOOD EVENING

AN OUTSIDE VERSION.—Our citizens have had enough of the Ingram case already, but, as the following from the Salem Statesman is an interesting version of it, we give it as perhaps the last: Sheriff Matt Scott, of Albany, arrived yesterday afternoon with Frank Ingram, the murderer, sentenced to a life term in the penitentiary for killing his brother, Henry, last fall. Frank Ingram has a very mean disposition and the deed that sentenced him to the penitentiary was one of the worst that appears in Oregon annals of crime. This trouble grew out of inherited property and the testimony produced at the trial showed he had struck his brother over the head with what is supposed to be a heavy revolver that he carried. The blow cracked the murdered man's skull and would undoubtedly have proved fatal even if Frank had not shot him twice through the heart and once through the head, either one of which would have been fatal. While confined in the county jail Frank made an effort to escape, but the sheriff was too sharp for him and he was compelled to lie in his cell until he received his sentence. He expected to be hanged and was overjoyed when he was sentenced to the penitentiary for life. "I never saw a man more relieved in my life, after the jury came in," said the sheriff yesterday.

THE JUBILEE SINGERS.—A Halifax paper says: The Jubilee Singers drew a big house at the academy last evening—a great deal larger than concert companies usually do. Fourteen pieces, divided into two parts, made up the program, but encores doubled the number. Nearly every piece was encored. The soloists were Mrs. Porter-Cole, C. W. Payne, and J. N. Caldwell and their numbers were gems. Mrs. Porter-Cole was in excellent voice, and sang "The Star of Hope" in a manner that captivated the audience. Her exquisite voice, of such range, power and tone, was fully equal to her difficult number, and an encore resulted. Mr. Caldwell is possessed of a magnificent bass voice, and rendered "Black Joe" in a splendid manner, giving as an encore piece "The Lazy Man," in a very laughable way. Mr. Payne's tenor solo, "Queen of the Earth," was also finely given, and was encored.

Sheriff Scott who returned from Salem, reports Ingram pretty well resigned to his fate. He refused to give his accomplice away. Ingram will probably be placed in the moulding department. The sheriff met Saunders, who is superintendent of the laundry department and in good health. He has hopes of being pardoned sometime, and was feeling for the public's pulse, but got no encouragement.

COUNCIL PROCEEDING.

Tuesday evening, March 22. Present—Mayor, recorder, marshal and Councilmen French, Stewart, Pfeiffer, Burkhardt and Hawkins.

The following bills were ordered paid: L. D. Miller, \$2; N. J. Henton, \$49.85; Standard & Cusick, 65c; Stewart & Sox, \$7.50; Albert Causley, \$5.70; C. A. Sims, \$12.69; Wm. Cohen, \$12.69; W. B. Barr, \$48; Robert Murphy, \$40.47; A. B. Lacy, \$32.50; Hopkins Bros, \$6.58; Albany agt. Frank Robertson, \$2.95; city agt. Lee Metler, \$2.95.

The committee on streets and public property recommended sidewalks as per petition of Geo. Ridinger and others. Adopted.

Same committee reported in favor of street improvements recommended by street commissioner. Adopted.

Petition of H. Bryant and others for street improvements was granted. Ordinances ordered to correspond with change.

In matter of petition of J. W. Reece and others in reference to alleged nuisance at Wm. Meyer's milk ranch, same was not adopted, committee finding that no nuisance existed.

The committee on fire and water reported that a test of hose had been made, 1400 feet, 800 of cotton and 500 of rubber, standing the test, and recommended the purchase of 600 feet more of rubber hose; that connections could be made with cisterns and flumes at 25 cents a foot, and asked that same be ordered. It was ordered that bids for hose be presented at next meeting, and that three cisterns be filed at once.

Recorder reported property owners in block 25, H's 2nd add, and 112 H's add, ready to connect with sewers except assignee G. W. Smith, who lacked authority.

City surveyor reported needed lateral sewer connection with Ferry street sewer.

Several sidewalks and other improvements were recommended by the street superintendent.

Petition of J. A. Crawford and others, asked that grade on Calapooia street be between Second and Third streets be changed. Referred.

Mr. David Froman asked that Santiam ditch be investigated where there is no bridge. Referred.

Several resolutions providing for street and sidewalk improvements were read. Sidewalk ordered adjoining Mr. Saunders' property in Third ward.

License was granted John Schmeier to sell liquor.

Bids for sidewalks abutting lot 1 in block 55 were opened and read as follows: 20 cents per foot, J. W. Reece; 18 1/2 cents per foot, and \$2 for excavation, B. F. Tabler; 20 1/2 cents per foot, N. C. W. Risley; 19 cents per foot, W. E. Gilbert; 19 cents per foot, \$2 per day for excavation, A. E. Causeley; 19 cents, W. E. Kelley. Contract let to W. E. Kelley to be completed in 20 days.
