INDIAN WAR VETERANS.—The last legislature passed a law authorizing the secretary of state to make a record of the names of all persons who served in the Indian wars from 1847 to 1857 in this state. Secretary McBride has employed Judge T. C. Shaw to do the work and the judge is now busily engaged in preparing the record, which will be published in book form, and will constitute a valuable book of reference.

Davis Bros. agt Wm Powers; to recover money. Verdict for plaintiff \$78.07.

O. C. McFarland agt Alice McFarland; divorce. Granted.

State agt M. R. Whitten; indicted for check. Verdict of guilty, sentenced to two years in penitentiary.

State agt J. D. Baker; larceny. Sentenced to five years in penitentiary.

State vs Frank Wilson; larceny. Sentenced to five years in penitentiary.
