Out of 250 scholars, representing nearly every state in the union, only 4 votes were cast for Hill; 162 were given for Cleveland, 46 for Boies, 26 for Palmer, 4 for Fowler, 8 for Blaine and none for Harrison.

A New York dispatch says: Judge Shipman has filed a decision in the case of Merriam vs Texas Siftings Publishing Company in the United States circuit court. In this case the defendant has advertised and sold as a premium for subscriptions to its weekly paper a reprint of the 1849 edition of "Webster's dictionary" on which the copyright had expired and which had been out of print for nearly thirty years.

The defendant had advertised its book in such a way as to induce the public to think that it was a copy of the plaintiff's later and revised editions of the unabridged dictionary on which copyright had not expired.

The judge grants an injunction "against the circulation or use of advertisements or circulars which tend to misrepresent the character of the (defendants) edition of Webster's dictionary or lead the public into the belief that it is a reproduction of a modern edition of that work," and requires that hereafter "each book delivered by it or its agents shall contain a notice by printed slip attached to the title page, that it is a reprint of the edition of 1847 of Webster's dictionary, with a list of the additions that have been made thereto and which the book contains."

Several newspapers in Oregon have been doing the same thing and it might be well to look a "little out."

Senator W D Washburn (rep) of Minnesota says:

"We are in a very curious position with the republican party. It is also a very dangerous position. There is an attempt to get general acquiescence to the proposition that President Harrison is sure to be renominated and republicans are asked on that account to make his renomination by acclamation. There is no enthusiasm anywhere for Harrison, and on the contrary there is a generally prevailing impression and opinion that his nomination means defeat provided the democrats take advantage of their opportunity and nominate a strong man. It has a serious result on the effects of any campaign to go into it with such a feeling permeating the party organization. The republicans ought to approach the Minneapolis convention unbiased and uninstructed, to look carefully over ground and select as a candidate on the date of the convention the statesman who appears to have the greatest elements of strength before the people. If New York State had a candidate who could give the party promises of carrying that state I think he could be nominated without any question. There are some western men talked about who would make the race successfully if a New York man is put on the ticket for vice president. There is one thing that cannot be overlooked, and that is that the people have decided in many elections that they want a new president every four years, that their mandate has all the power of a constitutional provision, and that a failure to recognize it is likely to bring the people's judgment at election time in a way to enforce their decision. The proceedings of the Indiana convention demonstrate very clearly that Indiana has internal republican dissensions which will be deepened by the president's renomination."

## MCKINLEYISM.

The question of admitting wool free to duty is summed up to mean the immediate annual transfer of over one hundred million of dollars a year of our money to foreign cheap labor on manufactured wool products and wool raised by cheap labor on cheap lands in South America and Australia, taking a like amount away from our enterprising manufacturers, well-paid labor, and not to prosperous farmers.—Albany Herald.

But of course when McKinley increased the duty on wool the promise was that the transfer of one hundred millions should be the other way. No more wool should be imported and better prices were promised by McKinley and his coadjutors. But what has been the result. Simply this: For the year ending December 31, 1890, (the year before McKinley's tariff went into effect,) the amount of wool imported into this country was 108,680,672 pounds. For the year ending December 31, 1891, (the first year after the McKinley law went into effect,) the amount imported into the United States was 139,317,571 pounds, an increase of 30,636,891 pounds under the McKinley law. From this it will be seen that the wool grower has but little to hope for from McKinleyism. The above figures are those furnished by the treasury department officials at Washington—all republicans. Attention of republican papers has been frequently called to this indisputable fact but they are always careful never to place them before their readers. But it will be of no avail to dodge them. The people are opening their eyes.
