GOOD EVENING

ALBANY'S POPULATION.—Mr. William Oberbauer has just completed his first rounds of the streets of Albany for his city directory. He is an expert at the business and has done the work thoroughly and correctly. He now has 197 back calls to make, that is of residences where the occupants were absent from their homes on his first trip. The first canvass shows 3382 residents. The 197 back calls will add at least 600 to the figures, probably more, say 612, making Albany's home population 4000, which is probably correct. The census returns of 1890 gave the city 2978. This shows an increase of over 1500 population in ten years, or else that the census was not correctly taken, probably the former, as Albany has undoubtedly had a very healthy growth. At the present time nearly everything is full and the amount of building in the last few years has been large, though there has been very little bluster about it.

PASCO.—A couple years ago "keep your eye on Pasco" was familiar to all. Now it is a cheat, and people generally think there is nothing left there. But there is at least a newspaper, as the following gasps from the Headlight will prove: Pasco is all right; it's you're liver that's out of joint. If a man could subsist on climate alone Pasco would be the paradise of the universe. What are you doing for Pasco? Get a move on you and don't sit around like a bump on a log. If you want to retain a live paper in this city get in with your purses and support it or there will be a funeral. A J. Littlejohn, of Tacoma, was in the city the first of the week, and predicted a bright and glowing future for the city which has no hope.

OREGON BOYS.—The Democrat makes a specialty of noticing the achievement of Oregon boys in the east; and it is a fact that almost universally they are at the top. There is evidently something about our climate that produces brain power. This time it is a Yamhill boy, and the McMinnville Telephone-Register says: "Another Oregon boy has distinguished himself for his ability in an eastern college. He is J. H. Littlefield, of Lafayette, recently secured first prize in a graduating class of 34 in St. Louis Medical college. His success not only reflects credit upon himself but upon the state he hails from as well, and Oregon can feel proud of him."

A MEAN JOKE.—The Lebanon Advance tells of the following enterprising to get a lost dog that didn't work. Many people living at a greater or less distance from Lebanon were put to a greater inconvenience on last Saturday by an advertisement which appeared in the city papers. The advertisement purported to be by a man who was on his way to Alaska and who was anxious to purchase hounds with which to hunt in the northwest territory. The truth of the matter is, a gentleman had lost a valuable hound and resorted to this ruse in the hope of recovering his property. No blame should attach to the newspaper, as we were paid for the work, supposing it to be a bona fide advertisement.

CHINESE FUNERAL.—Hooy, the Chinaman who died yesterday, was buried this afternoon. Funeral services were conducted in American style, under charge of Rev. Hill, at the Chinese mission rooms. Hooy, having been a Christian and member of the Sabbath school, though not yet baptized. Nine or ten carriages were used, and the affair was in every way conducted in a civilized manner. A grave was dug in the Celestial part of the cemetery; but Hooy's friends refused to have him buried with the heathens, and another grave was dug in a different location, among the remains of white people.

WATERLOO'S PROSPECTS are very bright. The new knitting mill there promises to be a big thing. About twenty car loads of machinery are expected soon. When completed the mill will employ about 200 hands, and in view of the prospects a large number of lots will be sold. Besides this mill negotiations are now pending for a linen mill. An important thing is the extension of the railroad there, and there are assurances that it will be done this year.
