

MORGANSTERN ARRESTED.—The following from the Roseburg Review is about a man recently in this city, who had the same borrowing proclivity when here: A J Morganstern, formerly connected with the Bradstreet Mortgage Agency at Portland, is in trouble and the county jail. He came to Roseburg Sunday, engaged a good room of Landford Wilkins and stated that his wife and mother-in-law would be along in a few days, and that he expected to get work during the session as court reporter. He stayed here until yesterday when he went to Oakland on the freight train, leaving left his bill unsettled for, and passed off a check on Loom & Tilton, Portland, for \$10. It was soon ascertained that Morganstern had no deposit at that bank, and Sheriff Miller telegraphed to Constable Howard to arrest him at Portland, which he did and brought him over last night. The fellow borrowed small sums from several parties during his stay in town and they are out of pocket to that extent.

ONE KIND OF ROBBERY.—The Oregon City Courier says: For \$225, paid in advance, D W Dunbar hired a freight car from the Chicago & Northwestern in Janesville, Wis., in which he stowed his household utensils, some new wagons and crushers, and a team of horses. He loaded the wagons and crushers into the car with the consent of the railroad officials, and left Janesville on the 8th. On his arrival here last week Friday, the Southern Pacific obliged him to pay the additional sum of \$97.50, on account of the wagons and crushers. Though the officials of the Northern Pacific inspected Mr Dunbar's car in St Paul, they made no objection to that part of his load. Here, when he is ready to unload, the railroad company demands of him \$100. Mr Dunbar says that 3 1/2 by 9 inch wagons wholesale at Janesville for \$50. A railroad official explains that Dunbar had no business to ship new wagons, which pay a higher rate than \$225, of which the N P takes \$200.

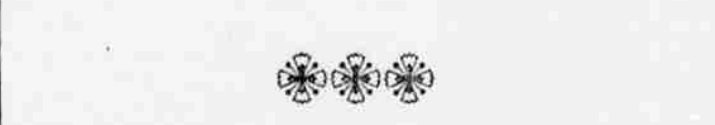

The Albany Base Ball Club is composed of young men in this city, every one of whom are hardworking young men, and who are playing ball for the sole purpose of creating and maintaining an interest in the "National Game." It seems poor encouragement, (especially coming from the Herald, one of whose staff at least has been endeavoring to organize a league which will include Albany to have their efforts thus lightly noticed. Is it any fault of the Albanies if the other side can't put up a good game? If the Albanies had thrown off in the game, then this same Herald would undoubtedly have scored a burning rebuke to them.
