GOOD EVENING

POOR RUSSELL.—Lane county is liable to have a very interesting law suit, according to the following from the Guard: As it is now pretty well established that a county cannot be sued for damages, there will probably be nothing in it, more than the interest in a peculiar case: Lane county is liable to have a large sized damage suit on hand from use of the jail. Thus Russell who is confined therein under a six months sentence has been treated somewhat as a trustee by Sheriff Noland and allowed the privilege of the sheriff's office occasionally. Of late he refuses to move the jail and the deputies have suspicions that his mind is weakening. It has been asserted on good authority that when his term of imprisonment expires he will begin a damage suit against the county. He will claim that the grand juries have often condemned the jail as an unfit place in which to detain prisoners, and ask damages for injury to his health.

TO-NIGHT.—The Fisk Jubilee Singers will be at the opera house tonight and deserve a large audience. A St John paper says: The largest and most appreciative audience that has yet greeted a performance or entertainment in the opera house was that which assembled there last night and listened to the harmonious renderings of the Fisk Jubilee Singers. And it is probable that not until St John people are witnessing the performances of others of the world's greatest artists will they be so favorable to their entertainers. The Fisk Jubilee Singers constitute an organization that has become famous, not only in America, but also in most European countries. They have entertained several monarchs and not the least appreciative of their efforts was Her Majesty Queen Victoria. But they were never more appreciated by an audience than last night.

FAKE NEWS is the heading the Salem Statesman gives to the following: The Telegram has curious ideas of what constitutes "age." Ever since the assault upon Rev Mr Metayer, the young Catholic priest at Albany, the Telegram has spoken of him as being a very "old" and infirm man, with one foot in the grave, and scarcely able to hobble around. On Friday, in dishing up the sentence of the two assaulting youths, the Telegram editor, in true "reportorial" style, commiseratingly styles the young priest as "aged and revered," and further on, as "patronizingly refers to him as the "old man." This must be intensely amusing to those acquainted with Mr Metayer, who is not more than thirty years of age and in the full enjoyment of health.
