

HILL'S STRENGTH

Within ten days after the Albany convention, in signal defiance of the end that convention was intended to compass, Rhode Island unanimously and positively instructed for Cleveland and gave an early keynote that the other forty-three states of this union would act independently.

Defeat in the New York spring elections under Mr Hill's candidature and leadership? Victory in Rhode Island and as a ringing Cleveland platform and a delegation positively instructed for Cleveland! The first victory in a presidential year since 1852!

VII. In the sixty-eight county conventions so far held in Pennsylvania sixty-six have elected Cleveland delegates. The Hill sentiment has prevailed in but two. Pennsylvania, the second state in the union, will either instruct her sixty-four delegates for Mr Cleveland or give him nearly a solid vote without instructions.

Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Michigan seem to be almost solid against Mr Hill and inclined to take a western candidate, though not decided whether to drop Cleveland and take up Boies or Palmer—and these states have 132 votes.

In short, while Mr Hill's strength since the Albany convention seems to have developed somewhat in the south, he has made little or no gain in the north, the northwest or New England; and it is significant that, in spite of the power of example, he is not receiving invitations from any states north of Mason and Dixon's line.

So much for the results to this date of Mr Hill's active personal and somewhat remarkable campaign.

It has revived Mr Cleveland as a sentimental possibility in the face of Mr Hill's unanimous state committee, unanimous delegation; the apparent unanimity of nearly all democratic politicians and office-holders in New York, and the seeming impossibility that Mr Cleveland can carry the state under such extraordinary circumstances.

The next president must be a democrat, even if he does not live in New York.—New York World.

The Salem Journal says the democrats bowed down to the golden calf of Wall street on the vote on the silver bill which practically defeated it. Poor deluded soul! We pity the Journal. It does not mention the hard, well-known truth that its own party has been bowing submissively at the shrine of Wall street for twenty five years.

In other words, sixty-four per cent of the democrats voting or paired favored the free silver coinage bill and thirty-six per cent of the democrats opposed it; while only thirteen per cent of the republicans voting or paired, favored the bill, and eighty-seven per cent opposed it.

The election to come off next Wednesday in Rhode Island is watched with interest. Since the organization of the republican party it has always voted against the democrats for president.

Hon J N Dolph has made a speech in the senate on "The Present Needs and Conditions of our Agricultural Interests." We know of nothing that our agriculturalists needs so much as a senator who would truly represent their interests instead of the interests of corporations and monopolies as the senator does almost exclusively.

Speaker Crisp told a congressman this morning he would refuse to bring in the cloture rule on the silver bill unless a majority of the democratic members agreed to support the committee on rules on it.

The Polk county, Georgia, democratic convention declares for Hill for president.

Hill's trip to the south has set politicians to work in his favor.

Sixty-eight county conventions have been held in Pennsylvania already by the democrats and sixty-six have elected Cleveland delegates.
