

GOOD EVENING

THE APOLLO CONCERT.—A large and enthusiastic audience attended the Apollo concert last evening. Ten encores were evidence of the enthusiasm. The concert proved one of rare merit for local talent, and places the Apollo club in the front rank among the state musical organizations. The program was opened with the soldiers chorus by the Apollos, to wit: 1st Tenor—Geo S. Achison, W. S. Thompson, Chas H. Hart, A. B. Prichard, 2nd Tenor—Wm Fortmiller, Fred Fortmiller, John E. Miller, C. E. Hawkins, O. C. McFarland, 1st Bass—John M. Connelin, Jr., L. D. Miller, Frank Connelin, S. N. Steele, J. C. Little, E. E. Goff, 2nd Bass—D. H. McCullagh, Chas A. Sears, C. W. Sears, W. H. Lee. Like all their selections it was finely sung, with Prof. Lee in front as musical director. Messrs Mueller, Phillips and Dubrille, of the Philharmonic club, were heard in the Schottische, "She's the Prettiest," and heartily encored. A vocal duet, "I Pescatori," by Mr. and Mrs. Prof. Davis, was sung with talent, receiving a live encore. Miss Moses was heard in the recitation of "King Robert of Sicily," with piano accompaniment. It was elaborate and was rendered with artistic effect. "Blow Gentle Gales," by the Apollo club, Miss Bertha Ellis sang "A Day Dream" in a manner to give her a position among our leading sopranos, and responded to an enthusiastic encore with a delightfully rendered selection. "The Firemen's Chorus," in costume, by the Apollo club, followed. The Philharmonic club were again heard in an instrumental selection and encored. The Apollo club sang, "Rocked in the Cradle of the Deep," which was warmly encored. Prof. Davis presented "Out on the Deep," and the audience called him back and received a good response. "The Bavarian Yodel," by the Apollo Club, with C. H. Hart, as soloist, was their best vocal effort, and received an encore. Mrs. Langdon, to hear whom is always a treat, sang "Dost Know," and received a deserved encore. The live affairs of the evening were the two selections by the Apollo vocalophone band, with a complete set of seventeen instruments. Mr. Sears sang "One Hundred Fathoms Deep" with excellent effect, and was encored. The entertainment closed with "Good Night" by the Apollo club.

RED TAPE.—County Clerk Paine has received from the secretary of a state "Register of Nominations," a red tape affair. The law to be followed in this regard is as follows: Immediately after each certificate of nomination is filed, the county clerk shall enter in a book marked "Register of Nominations," the date when the certificate was filed with him, the name of each candidate, the office for which he is nominated, and the name of the party, or convention, or assembly making the nomination, together with the names of the chairman and secretary certifying the same; and in case the certificate of nomination is made by individual electors, the names of the two signers who make oath thereto, and the total number of signatures thereto. As soon as the acceptance or withdrawal of the candidate is filed, it shall also be entered upon such register.

On motion the following committee order of business was appointed: J. R. Wyatt, R. S. Thompson, D. B. McKnight. Committee on order of business reported, which was amended and adopted. The following delegates to the state convention were duly elected: John R. Kirk, S. A. Dawson, O. S. May, W. R. Rankin, W. V. Parrish, H. B. Springer, R. A. Ranney, H. H. Hewitt, J. W. Miller, Sam. McIlrean.

The following nominations were then made: Representatives to the legislature—J. H. Wigle, W. W. Richardson and M. Acheson. County Judge—J. N. Duncan. Commissioner—J. W. Pugh, of Shedd. Sheriff—A. A. Kees, of Lebnnon. Clerk—David Andrews, Sweet Home. Recorder—W. D. Wright, Shedd. Treasurer—J. M. Waters, Brownsville. County Surveyor—E. T. Fisher. M. D. Phillips and Prof. Jewett were named for school superintendent, and were being balloted for at press time.
