GOOD EVENING

NEARLY A HUNDRED.—Mr John Crabtree, who died on the 29th of March, was a remarkable old man. He was born in Lee county, Va., on June 20th, 1800, in which state he was married on February 22nd, 1825, to the woman who survives him, at the age of 85 years. They had five children in old Virginia; they were then in Missouri, and had five more children; thence to Oregon in 1845, where they had five more children, fifteen in all. Sometimes Mr Crabtree jokingly proposed to go to California to see if the record would be continued. They stopped in Yamhill county; but moved to Linn county in 1846 and took up the donation land claim on which Mr Crabtree afterwards lived and died. Nine children besides a faithful wife, survive him. The deceased had been remarkably strong for his age until five or six months ago, when he began failing purely from old age. A long life, well spent is the record left. Mr Crabtree was buried in the Masonic cemetery near his home.

AFTER ELDERKIN.—The following from the Spectator, an insurance review of New York tells about the former manager of the Farmers & Merchants Insurance Co., who seems to be getting into trouble. We are informed that the Auditor of West Virginia is not likely to issue any more charters to wildcat companies, of which that state already has too many. On the contrary, it is stated that he will speedily bring to an accounting those concerns that have succeeded in obtaining charters under the lax laws of that state. The Wheeling Intelligencer of March 14 printed the following paragraph, indicating that the good work of extermination has begun: On Saturday warrants were issued by United States Commissioner B J Campbell for the arrest of T M Garvin, president, and J K Elderkin, secretary of the newly organized West Virginia Fire and Marine Insurance Company, the charge being using the mails for fraudulent purposes. The warrant was served on Mr Garvin, and he was released on his own recognizance.

ANYTHING about the Astoria R R is full of interest here. The talk says: "Two surveying parties, fully equipped started from this city this morning, their immediate destination being Olney. From there they will go at once to the 'divide,' where headquarters will be established, the engineers working both ways from that point. Work on this end of the line is not being neglected. Mr Grass was busy this morning making out bills of material and perfecting arrangements for pushing operations. Two land drivers are being built at Trullinger's mill and will be ready in a couple of days. Dodgers are being circulated in Portland advertising for 500 men to work on the Astoria & Portland railroad. This begins to look like business."

TO RUN DAY AND NIGHT.—H H Ames who came down from the mines a few days ago, reports preparations for continued active operations. A large quantity of ore has been gotten out, and in a day or two the mill will be run day and night. Deep snow has of course affected work during the winter, but during the summer there promises to be a live campaign. The ore gotten out is of a high grade.

From all the plats filed in the office of the county clerk, he finds that the streets of that town have never been christened. This is certainly a strange condition of affairs. IT PAID.—Walter F Burwell, of Portland, owns 800 acres in Whitman county, Washington, worth \$200000. This he works on an extensive scale. Last year the work was carried on under the direction of a salaried superintendent, and as the proprietors do not own any implements or teams, all work, including the use of teams, was paid for at ruling rates. In such cases as it was practicable, each kind of farm work was contracted at so much per acre. He raised 22,454 bushels of Red Chaff wheat, which he sold at 65 cents a bushel, \$14,595.61 and some grain hay for \$19325. Total \$14,788.86. His expenses were \$8,280.30, leaving a net balance of \$6,508.56, proving that farming does pay. The expense account is interesting, as follows:
