GOOD EVENING

THE REFORM SCHOOL.—There is a general impression that life in Oregon's reform school is sort of a picnic for the inmates. This is far from true, in fact the discipline is, as it should be, strict. The school is a prison for bad boys, with reformatory advantages. From Hon. Jeff Myers, who recently investigated the workings of the school, we get some interesting particulars. The boys on entering are made clean and dressed in neat gray suits. Then they are examined as to their qualifications, both as to work and studies. A certain portion of the day is given to each. The boys are taught a trade according to their inclination or fitness. At present, though, the trades are limited. At their meals they sit at tables with six or seven together, and have good, plain food. Each one bows his head before eating and asks a blessing, until all have done it. Neither at their meals or at work are they allowed to speak to each other without permission. If they do a black mark results. Good behavior brings credit marks, which means a shorter confinement, and a certain number are necessary to get out of the school; while bad behavior means black marks and the longest confinement. Besides Superintendent Miles, who is thoroughly versed in reform school work, there are now six teachers, guards, etc. The boys do their own laundry work, etc. At nine o'clock at night they are marched into a large room, where all are disrobed and their clothes locked up, so that they could only escape in their night gowns if an attempt was made. It will be seen that it is no play house. The directors of a school district have the power to sentence an incorrigible school boy. Justices, city recorders, etc., have the authority.

LIVE WATERLOO.—The Express says: The Waterloo Investment Co. have plotted 100 acres into about 450 lots, and are selling these lots at from 50 to 350 dollars. Thirty or more lots have been sold in the last thirty days, and the following gentlemen have built or commenced building: J. G. Gross, J. R. Carthew, D. Sheppard, J. R. Bailey, Hugh Mitchell, residences; A. E. Anzorge, residence and store; J. Munier, store, A. and O. Jennings, store, stable, Wm. Schultz, restaurant, Stannard & McNeal, meat market, H. G. Elum, H. Gilman and L. Ritter, residences. The main building for the Knitting Factory and Woolen Mill combined will be 127 feet long and 68 feet wide and three stories high. It is confidently expected that the building will be enclosed in 90 days and ready to receive the machinery, already bought and paid for, and now in San Francisco. It will take ten days to deliver this freight to Lebanon.

OF UNCERTAIN VALUE.—The \$90,000 worth of real estate which, according to the Salem Statesman, John W. Draper bought from the state board for \$10, proves to be of very uncertain value, as it is a rock pile lying in the river west of north from Canemah and is covered by water nine months in the year. The state school board refused a first filing on the same acquiescently from the W. F. Electric Co. and Capt. Apperson at Oregon City did likewise, and therefore, if the rock pile has any value, it does not seem how Mr. Draper, either in law or in equity can hold it. —Oregon City Courier.

APRON FESTIVAL.—The ladies of the 1st Presbyterian church will give an "Apron Fair" and supper at the opera house on the evening of April 15. Aprons from the different states and also from foreign countries, will be on exhibition and for sale. Supper from 6 to 8 o'clock, followed by a sociable, during which a program will be rendered, and other attractions offered. Ice cream and cake will also be served to those who wish it.

THE INSTITUTE.—The following appears in the proceedings of the teachers institute at Monmouth: In the afternoon session Professor W. J. Crawford, of Albany, read a well-prepared paper on the methods of bringing to exercise the different faculties of the mind. He said that the chief end of school work is mental evolution, rather than the storing of the mind with knowledge. He thought it wrong to require too much memory work. He spoke of the two methods of acquiring knowledge—the inductive and the deductive, and described the part each should play in education. A good paper on "Reading" was read by Mrs. A. J. Garland, of Brownsville. She said the value of being able to read well was generally underestimated. She called attention to the importance of correcting the tone as well as the language of pupils.

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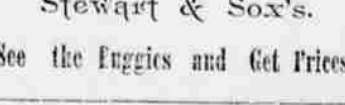
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
