TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

The Tacoma Election.

TACOMA, Wash. April 5.—The municipal
election held today was the hottest ever held
in Tacoma, resulting in the election of a
republican mayor, treasurer, city physician
and majority of the city council and prob-
ably the defeat of the candidate for con-
troller. Those elected are: H. S. Huson
mayor; G. W. Boggs, treasurer; S. C. Slaughter
controller, (probably) and Dr. Johnson Arm-
strong, city physician. The total vote was
7500. The majorities are: Mayor Huson,
1555; Treasurer Boggs, 36; Physician Arm-
strong, 129; Controller Slaughter, (dem.)
136. The republicans elect nine councilmen
the democrats six, and the independent re-
publicans one. There will be two contested
and the democrats may secure one or two
more councilmen.

Will Retaliate.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—Word came di-
rect from the Chinese legation today that
if the bill passed by the house yesterday
became a law it would be so offensive as to
cause retaliatory measures to be taken. It
is proposed to drive every American out of
China and to adopt such other means of re-
prisal as may seem necessary. One of the
functionaries said:
The house is a body of hoodlums. The
bill will never pass the senate. At any rate
our government will not be advised official-
ly unless the bill passes the senate, and that
will not happen.

Miller Coming.

NEW YORK, April 5.—Warner Miller of
New York, will soon be in Portland and
other cities on the Pacific coast urging that
more interest be taken in the subject of the
Nicaragua Canal. He has received invita-
tions from a number of people in the west
to make a tour of the coast and to
speak upon the importance of this subject.
Interest in the canal scheme has lagged in
the present congress, because it was known
positively that a bill looking to the govern-
ment's assistance of the scheme could not
possibly be passed in the house.

Temperance Victories.

OMAHA, Neb. April 5.—All the small
towns and villages held the biennial elec-
tions for city officers today. In most cases
politics were dropped, the principal issue
being the local option clause of the Slocum
law—whether saloons shall be licensed or
not permitted to run. The "wets" had a
majority in most of the villages. In several
places the women controlled the school
board elections and at Superior women
were elected to the board, defeating their
male opponents.

Dolph Rebuked.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—Senator Dolph
today presented protests from Oregon
against the license of the sale of liquor in
Alaska. These protests, in fact are in-
tended as a rebuke to the senator, because
he has introduced and championed a bill
looking to the regulation of the liquor
traffic in Alaska. The good temperance
people of the United States have already
taken offense at his position and now the
temperance people of his own state believe
it is proper to rebuke him for his position.

The Strike Ended.

OREGON CITY, April 5.—The strike in
the woolen mills is ended, the hands hav-
ing returned to work this morning. The
committee on arbitration rendered a deci-
sion allowing the company sixty days in
which to secure a new boss weaver to take
the place of Mr Haigh, who is now in
charge.
