This was when he was governor of Oregon. But he did not long remain on this coast. He returned to New Jersey and was elected to congress in 1851 and governor of that state in 1854. He was a delegate to the peace conference in 1861. He was always a 4emocrat. It is said that he expended \$200,000 of his private funds for the government while in California and has never been reimbursed. fornia and has never been reimbursed. This is extremely doubtful. At any rate the old governor is still living at the age of 74 years.-Enterprise.
