Republicans have a bare 2000 plurality in Rhode Island with the support of the entire national republican committee and the administration. The state is emphatically in the doubtful list.

The following is the ticket nominated by the democrats of Polk county, Saturday:

Senator, N. L. Butler; representatives, J. O. Staats and G. W. Myers; county judge, S. T. Burch; sheriff, Wm Douglas; clerk, Hugh Baldwin; commissioner, Hyerly; school superintendent, Charles Simonton; assessor, John McDowell; treasurer, A. Cain; surveyor, T. L. Butler; coroner, Dr. Crowley; county chairman, L. C. Parker.

It is said that Governor Patterson, of Pennsylvania, is laboring to secure an un-instructed delegation from the state to the national democratic convention, with the hope that he might ultimately use it to secure his own nomination. But he is destined to disappointment. The Harrisburg convention will instruct for Cleveland.

The impression that the defeat of ex-Gov. Campbell in Ohio last fall ended his political career is one that doesn't bight of subsequent events. Mr Campbell is still an important factor in the politics of this country, and he is the sort of man that the people take to. He will continue to be heard from.

The Portland Telegram says, "there is a standing premium" offered to any man "whose condition, in any way, has been bettered by the McKinley law." Hand over your premium, Mr. Telegram, to the editor of this journal. He has saved \$5 on his family sugar since the McKinley law went into effect.—The Dallas Chronicle.

The barometer of public opinion is fluctuating and responds quickly to any change in conditions. The main cause of democratic defeat in Rhode Island was that they were simply crushed with the use of money. From Eastern papers we learn that Dudley, the "Blocks-of-Five" man, was a few days before the election, sent for and taken to that state where money in unlimited quantities was placed in his hands, and he seems to have used it effectively.

There is a hard fight going on in Indiana between the friends of Cleveland and Gray for the delegation from that state to Chicago. They had a fierce fight at Indianapolis Saturday in the county convention, but the Cleveland men carried the day electing 80 Cleveland delegates to the state convention. It now seems there is no doubt that Cleveland will secure the state delegation.

At present the lower house is democratic, and Oregon should decrease this majority by the election of Hon W. R. Ellis. Of course, Mr. Hermann will undoubtedly succeed himself, but Eastern Oregon must protect her wool interests by giving Mr. Ellis a large vote.—Mountaineer.

TO BE TESTED IN THE COURTS.

County Clerk N. P. Payne has refused, in making up his notice of the coming June election, to place the office of attorney general in the notice as one to be filled at such election. A mandamus suit was filed today against him to compel him to so place the office in the election notice. The case will probably be heard about Wednesday at chambers before Judge Boise, at Salem, where an appeal will be at once taken to the supreme court. The purpose is to test the question as to whether Mr. Chamberlain, the appointee of Governor Penneyer, holds over until the election of 1894 or whether his term expires at the coming election.

THE TRUTH AT LAST.

Gov. Campbell's sharp challenge to the republicans to cite one instance in which wages have been raised in a protected industry since the passage of the McKinley law has at last extorted a reply from the author of that act.

No instances of increased wages are given, because they do not exist or are too rare to have significance. But instead of this Gov. McKinley said at Pawtucket, as reported in the Tribune:

No one ever claimed that protective tariffs were intended to increase wages. What the tariff does do is to maintain the American standard of wages, which is the highest on the face of God's earth.

The workingmen of Rhode Island must be astonished at the first assertion. It certainly was urged in congress and upon the republican stump that higher duties were needed to enable American manufacturers to pay higher wages. That an increase of 33 per cent. in duties was needed to maintain the old rate of wages was never argued nor believed.

But conceding this to be the object, how completely it has failed! There have been fifty cuts in wages in the protected industries to one increase. It must be plain now to the wage-earners why the McKinleyites in congress voted down a democratic motion to require the manufacturers to increase existing wages in every case by the full amount of the increased duty. The author of the law admits that "protective tariffs are not intended to increase wages."

It is true. They intended to enrich manufacturers and to swell republican campaign funds. And they do it.—New York World.
