ILL HOLMAN ARRESTED.—The following from the Eugene Guard tells about the arrest of a former resident of Benton county, across the Willamette from this city, until two or three years ago. I. L. Holman was arrested here Sunday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Croner on a complaint filed in the office of Justice Henderson by Pasco Sanders, charging him with the crime of larceny by bailer, and was brought here Sunday afternoon. It appears that last November Sheriff Noland attached Holman's team for a debt owed to J. M. Williams, by his order. Mr. Holman being a poor man the sheriff let him retain the team taking his receipt therefor. Holman about the first of the year sold the team to Pasco Sanders and went to Eastern Oregon. A few days ago Sheriff Noland went to look after the team and found them in possession of Mr. Sanders and, of course, took charge of them and that gentleman naturally filed a warrant against Holman charging him with the above crime. It seems that Holman demanded the team from Williams' attorney, on advice of a friend, as the law exempts a man's team from execution. Instead of this, he should have demanded them from the sheriff and not sold the property until it had been released. Legally he is probably guilty; but morally, he had no criminal intention. The case was postponed until Wednesday to allow Holman to procure the means to settle with Sanders. In the meantime he is out on his own recognizance.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mr. P. J. Laporte, the well known boot and shoe maker, died suddenly at 12:30 o'clock this morning, at the residence of Mr. Jake Stritel in the southern suburbs of the city. Since returning from California a few weeks ago, while waiting to get a home of his own, Mr. Laporte and family had been living with Mr. Stritel. Mr. Laporte was down street last evening in apparently as good health as ever. At the time stated Mrs. Stritel was awakened by Mr. Laporte's struggling and gasping for breath. Mr. Stritel was awakened by the noise and hastened to the room, raising the unfortunate man in his arms, when he thought immediately breathed his last. Mr. Laporte was a native of Michigan, moving from that state to California, where he resided about a year and a half, when he came to Albany, where he resided a couple years, excepting a short time spent in California recently. He was a man of good character, steady habits and was well liked by all who knew him. Mr. Laporte was a member of St. John's Lodge, A. F. & A. M., and had his life insured in a Masonic insurance organization for \$2500. He leaves a wife and three children to mourn his death.

CROOK COUNTY.—Arrangements being perfected to have some interesting races run over the Princville course, beginning about the 20th of May. Purses amounting to \$200 will be hung, and the intention is to have three running races and one trotting contest.

A SUPREME COURT DECISION.—The case of Chas. H. Dodd & Co. vs. Wm. St. John and Cynthia St. John involving the legal question of whether or not a buggy, a family vehicle, purchased by the husband, is a family expense for which the wife's separate estate would be liable, was decided by the Supreme Court yesterday in the affirmative. The court deciding that a buggy under the allegations of the complaint as pleaded, if true, constitute a family expense. Mr. G. W. Wright, of this city, as attorney for Mr. Dodd, there by scores another legal victory in the Supreme Court.

STREET RAILWAY EXTENSION.—The street railway company are making arrangements to begin active work on the extension of the road to the Viereck addition. Bids will be opened in a few days for about \$5,000 feet of lumber, and the company will probably do the work itself. It is also likely that a line will be run down First street in the Third ward. Whether a line is run to the fair ground will depend on whether the people out that way want it or not. No suburban locality needs a line more.

A BAKER CO. MINE.—A gold brick of about 300 ounces of the value of nearly \$600 was brought in from the Balsey-Likhoon mine yesterday by Mr. L. W. Nelson, manager and superintendent of the mine, and deposited at the First National Bank. When the large 60-ton mill plant now in course of erection on the Balsey-Likhoon is completed and in operation, the monthly output will be something to get the mining world thinking.
