LEBANON.—E. C. Phelps has bought four acres of land adjacent to Waterloo and took possession last week.

Mr. Shedd came to Oregon in 1846 settling on the place where he has since resided. The town of Shedd was named after him. He was a man of sterling worth, upright in all his dealings, and leaves a good record. He was a member of the state legislature in 1874 serving the county with credit. He was father of Hon. C. S. Shedd, of Shedd, Prof. Shedd, of the Monmouth State Normal school, and leaves two other sons and one daughter. Mr. Shedd was a native of New Hampshire. Among our noblest pioneers he will long be remembered among those who helped to build up this country.

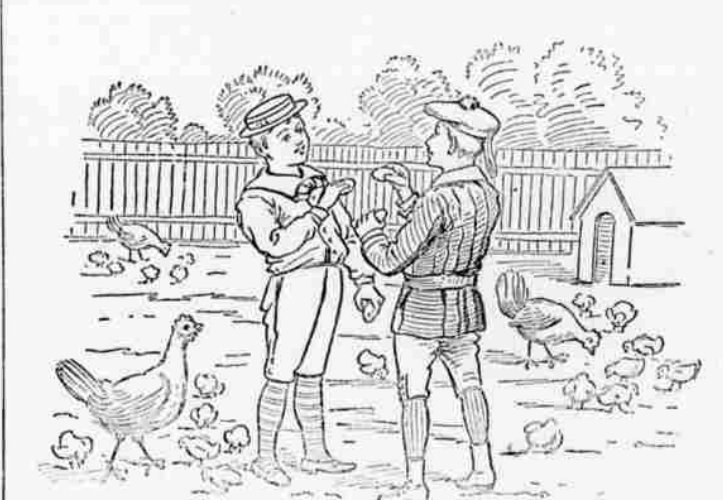
