

LIGHT FROM CONNECTICUT.

At last a judicial decision has been reached in the Connecticut political complication. The Connecticut episode is one of very grave importance in our political history.

In Connecticut, in 1890, Morris, the democratic candidate, was elected governor by a majority of 26. The other democratic candidates had absolute majorities ranging from 290 to 1,672.

For one year and nearly four months there has seemed to be no remedy. The courts have been appealed to but they have not remedied the evil. Indeed, the supreme court has held practically that a remedy is impossible on the face of the facts.

Nevertheless such an outrage is a dangerous menace, and the men who are guilty of it are the enemies of free institutions and of a republican form of government.

Judge Hall's decision to the effect that the democratic candidates have a remedy by quo warranto is consequently of importance not only to the state of Connecticut but to the whole country.

For itself the DEMOCRAT has to say that it is unalterably opposed to the levying of a duty for protection. This we have repeatedly said. If it be decided that the levying of duties upon imports is the best way to raise the necessary revenues to support the government, then so be it, but let the duty be levied so as to raise revenue and not protect.

For the twenty years commencing with the year 1870 and ending with the year 1890 it cost the tax payers and farmers of Marion county the enormous sum of \$2,099,443 to run the affairs of that county. During the same period it cost the farmers and tax payers of Linn county the sum of \$583,827.03 to pay the running expenses of Linn county.

The fusion ticket nominated by the democrats and independent republicans of Multnomah county will poll a strong vote and most of it will be elected so its friends claim. There never was a place so badly ridden as Portland and these democrats and republicans who have broken loose from party ties in order to smash the dangerous machine deserve to succeed whether they do or not.

At the Malheur democratic county convention a vote was taken among the delegates on presidential preferences with the following result: Cleveland 55, Hill 2, Palmer 3. This is getting monotonous.

The republican party believes that the government has a right in the cause of protection to tax the people to that degree that domestic manufacturers may establish enormous industries, which in turn combine to form trusts and syndicates and monopolies, which plunder the people, exclude foreign competition, and build up monstrous private fortunes.

The democratic party now and ever has believed that taxation should be limited by the needs of the government, justly and economically administered; that the government has no right to exact one dollar or tax from one man to build up the private fortune of another man under any pretext of the general good; that excessive taxation is robbery and tends to the establishment of classes, a condition abhorrent to free men and destructive to greatness.

We would like to know what our alliance democrats can find in hanging on to the democratic party. If they do, it certainly will look like bad faith.

But why will it any more look like bad faith for alliance democrats to remain faithful to their principles and party than for republicans to do so? Will the Herald explain? Further, why can it be regarded as an act of bad faith for a democrat who has, in good faith, become a member of the alliance under the repeated assurance that it, the alliance, in no way interfered with a man's political views and party relations, to remain faithful to his party? Will the Herald explain this?

A dispatch from Atlanta says: The state executive committee of the Georgia state alliance met here tonight and unanimously adopted a resolution demanding that all alliances which have endorsed the people's party movement must rescind such action promptly, or surrender their charters.

An agreement has been reached among democrats of Indiana whereby the delegation to the national convention shall use all honorable means to secure the nomination of Cleveland and, in case of failure, to labor earnestly to secure the nomination of Gray.

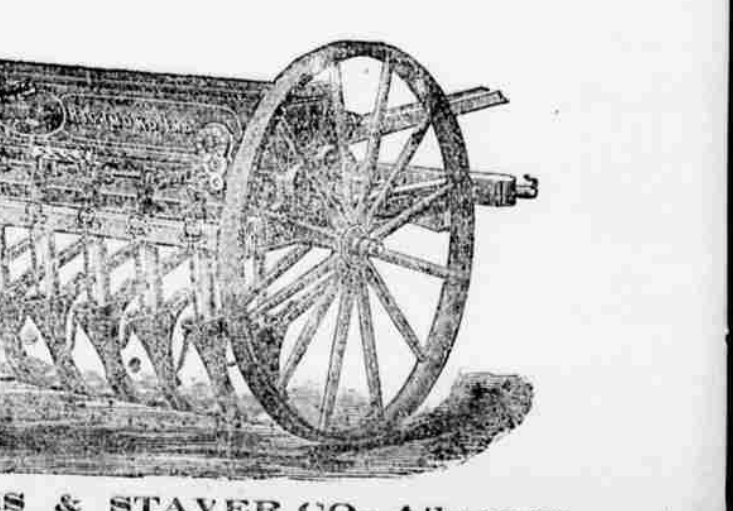
