WASHINGTON, April 11, 1892. Republicans are no longer doing much talking about the "do nothing House."

It has leaked out that prominent republican members of the Senate Finance Committee wish to dodge the tariff issue by smothering these bills in committee.

Another reason for wishing to smother these bills is that there are several republican senators who are considered by the republican leaders as shaky on the tariff question.

Commissioner Raum's attempt to draw the attention of the country away from his own shortcomings and mismanagement of the Pension bureau, because a man who had been employed by Representative Cooper, of Indiana, had used that gentleman's signature to obtain information from the Pension office.

The case with which a real estate pool has been shuffling off depreciated ground upon the government at a fabulous price is creating much talk.

Last week a bill was presented in the senate to build a new Patent office in the same locality and on a like foundation at a cost of \$3,500,000.

Mr Shively, of Indiana, reported from the committee on ways and means the bill to reduce the duty on tin-plate, and it was referred to the committee of the whole.

The committee states that the bill provides that on and after Oct 1, 1892, the duty on tin plates, terne plates and taggers tin shall be one cent per pound (instead of 2.2 cents), and that on and after Oct 1, 1894, they shall be admitted free of duty.

The report criticizes the McKinley act and contends that the increase of duty on tin plate was not for the purpose of raising necessary revenue nor of fostering an existing tin plate industry.

The only purpose of the increase of the duty, the report says, must have been to compel the use of sheet iron for roofing purposes in preference to tin or to tax living, self-supporting industries, to bring into existence an industry which the millions of dollars exacted from American consumers since 1842 had not quickened into life.

If the former was the purpose, it is argued, it involved a wanton sacrifice not only of the tin-roofing industry but also of the interests of those who use tin-plate for other than roofing purposes.

Continuing the report says: "The importations of tin plate, terne plate and taggers tin for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1890, amounted to 680,379.025 pounds. The importations for the last fiscal year were 1,036,074 pounds.

"It is probable that 800,000,000 pounds is a fair estimate of the present annual demand. Being a revenue article, the present condition of the public revenues suggests for the present a retention of a part of the duty.

"The McKinley act granted privileges; the proposed act restores rights. Nothing is withheld from any American industry which in reason belongs to it, while that relief is granted to many American industries to which by every consideration of justice and sound policy they are unquestionably entitled."
