Saturday evening, April 16th. Present.—Recorder, Marshal, Street Superintendent, and all Councilmen.

In the absence of the Mayor, Councilman Stewart was elected Mayor pro tem.

A ballot was had for 600 feet of hose, and on the sixth ballot the contract was ordered let for the White Anchor hose, Long & Scott, of Portland, agents, at \$1.10 a foot. This is the make of hose that has already served the city well, some purchased in 1876 being in use now.

Ordinance 247 providing for connection with the Perry street sewer was read three times and passed; also ordinance 248, authorizing the Mayor and Recorder to make contract for hose.

A batch of resolutions in reference to sidewalks and other improvements, including the condemning of the right of way for all letters connecting with the Madison and Maple street sewers, were passed.

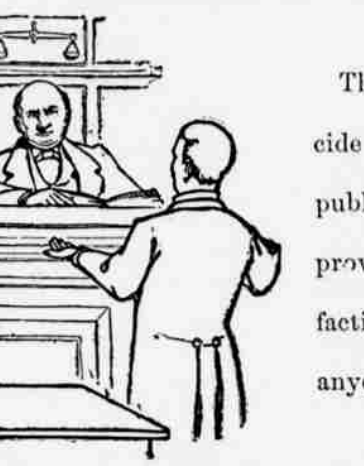
