GOOD EVENING

AFTER MANY YEARS.—In the supreme court of the U S a case decided yesterday was that of Neal vs John A and William Crawford, involving the good faith and validity of deeds for six different pieces of real estate, including mill property, lots and blocks in Albany, Or. These were cross appeals from the circuit court of the United States for the district of Oregon, Neal appealing from the decree of the court below sustaining the deeds from James H Foster to John Crawford for five of the six tracts. This decree was affirmed, and William Crawford appealed from the decree of the court below, setting aside the deed to him for the one tract. This decree was also affirmed. Mr Mitchell represented the Crawfords and Mr C E S Wood, of Portland, Mr Neal. This decision is in favor of John A Crawford, so far as property deed to him is concerned, but is against the transfer of the Foster block to William Crawford, now deceased. That block, worth at least \$20,000 will go to the creditors of J H Foster & Co., and be sold for their benefit. They are W H Goltz and many others. Neal being a California man to whom the claims were transferred in order to get the case in the U S courts.

THE CORVALLIS P. O.—The Times says: The best evidence that Corvallis is making steady advancement is a report of the business transacted at our postoffice during the past year. These reports are made out quarterly and show a steady increase in business that furnish unmistakable proof of our prosperity. The total receipts at the office for the quarter ending June 30th, 1891, was \$1,068.15; for the quarter ending Sept 30th, \$1,091.34; for Dec 31st, \$1,265.63; and for March 31st, 1892, \$1,355.68. This shows an increase in the last quarter over the first of 37 per cent, and is an index that our city is proportionately increasing.

STOCK INCREASED.—At a meeting of the Building & Loan Association last evening the directors were authorized to increase the capital stock from \$200,000 to \$300,000, the number of shares from 1000 to 1500. This was made necessary by the new series constantly being added. The association is proving a fine thing for Albany, and deserves a liberal support.

BECOMING NECESSARY.—The merchants of Corvallis organized a "Business Men's Protective and Business Association" last Friday evening. The object of the association is to protect themselves against bad customers and enhance the business interests of our city. The officers elected are S L Kline, president; A F Hersher, vice president; F M Zieroff, treasurer and Chas Hodges, secretary. It will meet on the 3rd Friday of every month.—Times.

AN INCENDIARY FIRE

This morning about 1:30 o'clock the fire bell gave the first night alarm in several months, giving the horses their first opportunity to run in patent fire harness. No. 1's old good work; but No. 2's became frightened at a hose cart and refused to draw the engine. The fire was in the shed of C E Wolverton's house in the adjoining block to No 2's engine house, occupied by Mrs E C Rainwater as a boarding house. Some of the boarders discovered it when first set. Prompt work with buckets by three or four young men extinguished the flames, after about \$25 damage had been done, fully covered by insurance in the Farmers & Merchants Insurance Company. The fire was incendiary. A lamp had been taken out of Mrs Rainwater's room and was found in the woodshed broken. A can of coal oil, containing three gallons, was found emptied, undoubtedly in the place where the fire was. Mrs Rainwater's version was that some time ago Mike Preslin, a riveter on the bridge, who had boarded with her had been required to leave on account of being suspected of having stolen a ring, and that he probably did the burning. In fact that another attempt had been made previously, she thought by him. Marshal Hoffman found the man, and placed him in jail. On his person was found the missing ring, lost by Miss Burgess, a boarder. The initials J. H. S., that of a brother, were on the inside, and will probably convict him of larceny. When arrested Preslin was in a saloon, and drew a big 44 bull dog revolver on a man. He was taken before Recorder Henton and fined \$20 for carrying concealed weapons, and will be prosecuted on the other charges. After leaving Mrs Rainwater's Preslin had boarded at the Pioneer, from which he was shipped and went to the Exchange.

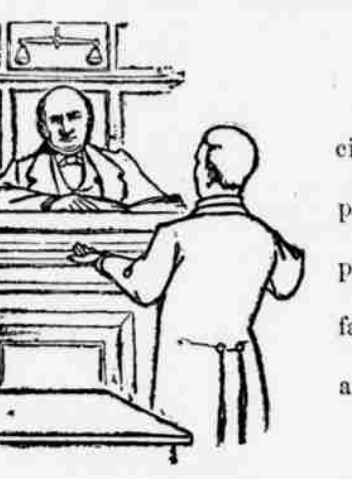

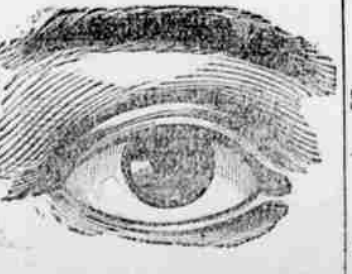
