TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

A Railroad Sold
PORTLAND, April 20.—In accordance with a decree of the United States circuit court, George H Durham, master in chancery, sold at noon yesterday, at the door of the United States courthouse, the Hunt system of railroads, so-called, comprising all the railroad and telegraph lines of the Oregon & Washington Territory Railroad Company. This line runs from Wallula Junction to Pendleton, in Oregon, and to Walla Walla in Washington, a distance of ninety-three miles. There is a branch sixty-five miles in length from Pendleton to Athena, formerly Centerville one of twenty-two miles from Eureka Junction to Eureka Flat, and one from Walla Walla to Dayton, thirty-five miles in length. This makes all told a combined mileage of 165 miles of completed road now in operation. C B Wright, of Philadelphia, bought it for \$1,250,000.

Live Fighting.
NEW YORK, April 20.—A special to the Herald from Puerto Cabello, Venezuela, says: "This report is in a terrible state of excitement over the utter rout of the government troops April 14. At sundown, that date, Palacio's army made its final and futile attempt to dislodge a force of insurgents under the command of General Mora, who were entrenched at a spot just beyond Centerville. Discouraged over their ill success, Palacio's troops showed signs of panic, but under the stirring appeals of their leaders, they rallied and again charged the foe. The encounter was brief, but furious. They were defeated all along the line, and turning fled in every direction.

Unfortunate Miners.
MINERSVILLE, Pa April 20.—A horrible accident, by which ten or twelve miners lost their lives, occurred this evening at the Lytle colliery, located on Primrose Mountain, several miles northwest of here. The works tap the great Wolf Creek colliery, which has been idle for some years, owing to large accumulations of water. The old water lies in it, and it was the sudden bursting through of one or two of these deposits that caught the unfortunate miners while at work. Three American miners, named Polkin, Bell and Buggy, are among the dead, and it is thought at least six Hungarian and Italian laborers are also drowned. There were several scores of men inside at the time. Many of them swam out.

The Astoria Railroad.
ASTORIA, April 20.—It is estimated that about 500 men are now at work on the Astoria & Portland. The headquarters in the field are on the south fork of the Lewis and Clark River, whence the track will trend eastward to the Nehalem River and thence to Hillsboro. The men are paid \$2 a day, and board costs \$5 a week. Mules, horses and grading material have been brought here from the Great Northern, by way of Klamath. On arriving here, the boats and barges proceed to the Lewis and Clark and sail up that river as far as they can. Contractors Corey Bros & Co have sub-let a part of the work.

The Boomers
GUTHRIE, O T April 20.—It rained the greater part of the night and turned very cold this morning and is still misty. The thousands who are in the new lands without shelter, suffer greatly. It is reported two rival colonies quarrelled over the right of precedence at South Canadian Ford, and four men were shot, two seriously. North of Kingsfisher, a negro was shot by a cowboy, who jumped his claim.

A Mushroom City
MORNING, O T April 20.—Yesterday morning Okarche was a lonely depot on the Rock Island road. This morning it has 1500 inhabitants, including twenty women. There is a grocery store and lumber yard, both doing a rushing business. About the first men to alight were two drummers, who went right to work taking orders.

The first lot of living goods brought to Albany was a lot of potatoes, which were sold at 10 cents per bushel. The potatoes were of the 'Red Skin' variety, and were of fine quality. The lot was sold by Wilt & Stark's.
